Excellent job of preparing students—talking about their interests, future plans; through class offerings; with years of test prep; through internships, clubs, extracurricular activities. Lots of offerings for the students to get involved in the school. The staff we have encountered at Dickinson all the way to the HS have been so wonderful inspiring my kids to be wonderful learners. Ifeel like the district manages it's resources and supports its students better than Green Bay. I don't have specific a example, it is just a strong feeling I have. I believe that the quality of the staff and their ability to be flexible to different types of learners is strong. The community programs, school events and togetherness are amazing. Despite being in the top 10% of largest school districts in the state, it does still feel smaller and tight knit than you would expect. I think our district is great because of the community camaraderie and the education that is given is top notch. Unique because it's running off of a 20year old budget....special because it has multiple sports booster clubs Ilike how open the teachers and principal are at Dickinson. I have found that they Are helpful and receptive with my child's needs. I like that they discuss emotions and feelings and let kids express them so they are used to doing that. Yery caring and engaged teachers and opportunities for students to be unique Overall, high-quality leaders and teachers. Caring. Overall sense of pride among the school community.

- The De Pere community has a population profile of households that tend to be more affluent and more educated (relative shares). These parents expect more and are willing to contribute more, e.g., volunteer time. There is a tradition of excellence regarding the De Pere schools and the community which attracts more people to the community. Qualified teachers would rather work in this district than in GB, which helps with attraction and retention. You don't hear of as many incidents in school as with the GB schools. Keeping the kids together from Intermediate to High School builds a great esprit de corps.





## Comments/questions/suggestions: (n=256)

- Our district does a wonderful job educating students that are typically developing. However, students who have significant learning disabilities or cognitive disabilities are not always provided with appropriate opportunities to learn. The general education setting and attending whole group instruction is not appropriate for all of these students. We need to provide opportunities and programs for these students to be successful in school and beyond.
- The website is very difficult to use. When I need a calendar item, late start time, etc. I need to dig for it rather than important relevant information being easily accessible.
- There is too much emphasis on sports and AP classes. We need to support all students. College is not the only option to be successful.
- There is a huge focus on university attendance beyond graduation at DPHS. Too little attention is given to all of the alternatives to that 4 year education experience. There is a sense here among students, parents, and even some staff, that technical college, apprenticeships, and workplace training experiences are considered less than, or not as good as a bachelor's degree path. That leaves a lot of our population out when it comes to preparing them for success in the future.

- I feel that DePere's expectations of students is about the same as many other schools. In order to achieve excellence, I think we need a community shift, where we change our focus from "get these kids to graduation" to "get these kids an education". Increasing the rigor of the curriculum would help with this, as would creating and ENFORCING a plan for struggling students.
- The district is growing a ton. Smaller class sizes used to be a bit part of the district, but in the upper grades, class sizes have grown tremendously. There needs to be more room in the building and more teachers to accommodate the growing population and keep class sizes lower.
- While I do think that we have the support of the community, there are times that I also think that parents can attempt to get a little too involved without as much information as they think they have. There is also a strange phenomena, having come from another district, that parents tend to want to find a blame for lack of accelerated success rather than understand that some kids just need a little more time, support, etc. I have never been personally attacked by a parent, but as a colleague I have seen other teachers break down by the way the parents have talked to them or from messages that have been sent. We also would like to think that the success and achievement that has been a part of the USDD should be recognized as a sign of a strong system and that too many changes to a system without a strong vision and why could be misguided. Again, having been in other districts, De Pere is a strong system and changes should be more tweaks to go from good to great vs. huge overhauls.
- The retest and late work policies at the HS really do kids no favors at all. It definitely does not prepare them for what lies ahead. No college, tech school or boss in a job situation will let them have a "do over" or accept work that is past the deadline. Why is that happening at the high school level? I'm not even talking about a few days late...I'm talking weeks or months after the due date and work often must be accepted. That's ridiculous. I also feel like parents aren't informed about all the other options available to their students. I had no idea my child could have taken classes at NWTC or gotten credit for work experience. This would have helped motiviate her more than the senior math class for example. I'm so glad we have new leadership at the top as I feel like this district has been operating on fumes and is so very stagnant.
- While most classes are trying to prepare students for life after high school, there are some policies such as late work, cheating, and discipline issues that are doing students a disservice as they head into the workforce/universities.
- Our building principals need to do a better job of getting input/feedback from all staff members and not just a chosen few.
- I feel that our strong focus on academics often does not leave room for SEL and doesn't incorporate it into instruction well overall. Many teachers need more useful and practical PD in equitable practices. Some administration needs to take a stronger stance on expectations for some students to ensure all students are safe and teachers are set up for success.

- Covid safety has been disregarded. For example common sense masking for two weeks after a holiday break would be a responsible practice.
- We need to increase behavior and responsibility expectations for students especially at the secondary level before they leave us into the world.
- We have had several incidents where staff have been threatened and nothing is done. This is very concerning.
- Have students learn about career options outside of a 4-year college plan. More options to learn about apprenticeships/alternate training would be great for students who do not want to attend college or may have financial limits.
- I am concerned about our administration and the direction we are heading. Most professional faculty are micromanaged either through PLCs being driven by admin, (not teachers) or "building leaders" being led to believe they have input in matters, but only to be thrown under the bus when administration doesn't want to admit unpopular decision making or lack of foresight. In most cases our district lacks foresight and forethought when it comes to decision making. It is a rarity that faculty is genuinely included for conversation or feedback. Over the past 10 years there seems to be a divide of faculty on a 'need to know' basis. There is a lack of trust and appreciation. There is an absenteeism of administrators whereabouts and presence in the school, unless it's during aforementioned PLC time. At the speed we are going, veteran staff will choose other places based on lack of professionalism and input. Hopefully a new superintendent will recognize and be an agent of change in this culture.
- I am staff and I see how some students are disrespectful, swearing, and disruptive to staff and teachers. I don't know what the standards are to combat this. I have heard from students about why they swear or are disruptive and they say because they can. I think the middle level kids are getting lost also. I know families want to be in this district and I believe the standards should be kept to a higher level, ie like no swearing ,dress appropriately, respect in class to teachers and fellow students.
- I think the DePere schools really focus on the higher learners too much which is only about 10-12% fo each graduating class. Often times those on the Honor Society are there because of who they know, not what they know. My children have all walked away from graduating from the district believing that since they are not an AP student they have no future or potential in college. Teachers actually say that to the students leaving our juniors and seniors feeling hopeless and starting to panic or give up. The only thing recognized are good grades, not good character or perseverance. You never hear those stories, you only hear about the top athletes or the top students. That is a small group of students that get recognized and the others just get lost or don't matter. There is more to a student than just grades. Perseverance should be recognized in some way.

- I know that I can easily contact a teacher or a principal with any issues, but I do not feel that the district as a whole communicates effectively. I think that the website is awful! It is very hard to navigate (it is not user friendly) and it isn't always up-to-date with information/ documents with incorrect and out of date information are linked in several spots. I also find the Infinite Campus Teacher Messenger that is used throughout the district very impersonal and off-putting- it is also often hard to tell who the email is coming from/ which member of the household it is directed at. I do think that almost everyone in the buildings are doing their best, but because the district has not kept up with technology, it isn't adequately preparing students for potential careers.
- Although much has been done to increase safety and security in recent years, I think there is a potential for a dangerous situation to occur since we do not get any cellular service in at least one of our elementary schools. There could be an emergency situation where a cell phone is required to access emergency personnel/resources, and they won't work. I often think about this when we do our ALICE drills or when the power goes out and the real phones don't work either. This should be improved.
- Increase expectations by removing cell phones from school. Advance academics by offering foreign language earlier than 7th grade.
- the students as a whole are like any other group of teens these days look around the cafeteria after lunch or the gym after a basketball game. there is zero respect for the people who come after them. the rules are entirely inconsistent. form due on Monday -- well, Wednesday, well, her mom called so we'll take it on Friday. BE CONSISTENT. the school is very much geared toward college bound students. We have more than enough offerings of AP classes we need to better address special ed students for real life and tech students for the workplace.
- The district does a nice job meeting the needs of students who want to attend a four year college. However, there are many other students who want to choose other options for their future. The variety of classes offered each semester is quite limited for non college bound students. Even if a tech class does run, there is maybe one or two sections and kids can't get into them. I think math is a huge concern. There are some students who are not ready for Algebra when they come to high school, yet this is the lowest level class unless you are in special or alternative education. Many of the science rooms are outdated, have gas lines that don't work, don't have fume hoods, ventilation is sporadic and the equipment is getting old.

- In terms of development of students, the district is doing our students a disservice if we don't have a stricter policy on students and cell phones. Cell phones are the #1 biggest detriment to our student body's learning, and every teacher knows this. The problem only gets worse when every teacher has their own "take" on the cell phone policy. This makes some students now have personal feelings and resilience against teachers who have stricter policies than others. Without a unified front on this from the top down, this will get worse. It seems that we are now at a point where from a truly young age our students have had a phone in their hands, and their inability to put it away in the classroom is a major distraction. COVID made this worse, and without any intervention from the district and staff, our students' achievement scores will decrease and their screen times, social media addictions (and corresponding mental health issues), and even cyber bullying events are going to increase.
- Include staff on more perception surveys and opinion sharing. Even simple google forms help get data.
- I believe our leaders are trying, but the needs are high which limits their ability. The buildings need work (leaking floors/ceilings, heating and cooling problems, space issues, plumbing, etc. Class sizes are big and elective areas are running out of space which is limiting student choices for classes. We have grown tremendously, but have not increased staff. Everyone is stretched thin and this affects teachers time and ability to work with students one-on-one. We are also losing high quality teachers because they are going to other districts or leaving the profession.
- The term accountability has come up more and more. Holding students accountable for their actions and behaviors seems to sometimes be an issue/struggle which would tie into "developing students' character. Phone use, cheating on tests, assignments, respecting teachers and classmates, consequences to being written up, etc.
- Our students to have opportunities for apprenticeships and prep for education after school, there is a high percentage of our graduates who go off to a 4-year school and then have to switch to NWTC. In the past, I have seen a focus on content and not enough on "How to learn." Success out of school requires this as content will only take a student so far. Additionally, we do not have the facilities or resources particularly in our Engineering and Tech Ed. to properly expose students to all of the things they can do. Classrooms are way too small and outdated. Space for our engineering equipment is very limited as well as for our shops. We have numbers of students in many courses that are double what they should be for students to get a deeper understanding of careers and needed skills.
- Not overly pleased with Foxview and their staff with some situations with bullying. We have brought up the concern a couple of times and nothing has been resolved. Also situations with the supervisors that weren't stellar.

- Since I was unable to add any comments to the staff only tab, I would like to do it here. Although I agree that the district offers strong academics and support for learners, I feel the burden falls on the classroom teacher the majority of the time. As a classroom teacher at the elementary level, the load to do ALL is heavy. We are expected to provide strong academics, support all learners, provide social emotional (mental health) support, and technology opportunities to name a few without things taken off our plate. How can we as a building share more of the responsibility across classrooms and specials' teachers? How can we hire additional staffing that supports teachers and students in some of the areas of high need (social/emotional health and technology to name a few) to assist elementary classroom teachers that are trying to deliver the strong academics as well as support academic needs of all learners?
- I do not feel that our new website is effective. It is difficult to find information and is not intuitive to click through and find things. It has decreased our access to information because it is too cumbersome to navigate.
- We need more work time. All of our early releases and late starts are now run by admin and are based on their agenda. The agenda often feels like 'filler'. This is extremely frustrating when we are so overwhelmed with everything that needs to get done. Having time to work should be valued and offered whenever possible. According to veteran teachers back in the 1990's, these days were originally meant for teachers to have work time to prepare for the upcoming month. Over the years, and many admins later, these have been overtaken and now agendas are dictated.
- With new leadership changes it is hard to know if we are going in the right direction or not. I haven't seen much from leadership yet this year to show where we are going and what our top priorities are for change. At the start of the school year staff meeting there were discussions of ideas for change, but I haven't seen much to say that we are moving towards anything new yet. In my opinion, parts of the new website are confusing or not organized well. That is why I listed a disagree there. Also, as a staff member, I do not feel that I am given many opportunities to voice my opinions. And when I am, I do not know that I believe that I am heard. I believe we say we have high expectations for students, but we don't actually follow through with those. I believe we showcase our top performers and like to say we have academic excellence, but I believe our middle and low students are struggling. And I feel like many times we don't know what to do with them so they either just fail and we push it off until they are a Senior and then try to shove them through. Or we cut corners to get them to a D-. I also do not feel that we hold students to high behavioral expectations. I do not see follow through with correcting behaviors and enforcing rules by our administrative team. It seems that if it has to do with vaping then we will deal with it, but if it deals with almost anything else we avoid giving a consequence. As a teacher, I often do not feel that I am supported when I try to hold firm on a higher behavioral expectation.
- Where we lack is in the area of a diverse workforce. We need to do more to recruit and retain individuals from a wider variety of demographics. An emphasis on this will benefit everyone the staff, the students, the community, and all of our stakeholders.

- I think we could do a little better preparing kids for college and other potential trades-type careers. Most students go on to some type of college after high school, but I think we could do a much better job with our tech ed. equipment and materials. That area needs a complete overhaul. The staff is great, but the facilities part is very outdated. The "retake" system is not really helpful for kids past high school. The way it goes now doesn't help students when they get out of high school.
- In the past, De Pere seemed to be 'known' for educating 'all' students for a 4 year college degree. With more local careers in the trades and 'non' 4 year college degree careers, we need to do a better job of promoting these opportunities. With our new hiring of a youth apprenticeship 'coach', they are starting to do a good job of turning this around. We also need to bring in a career fair for a day to show all high school students the opportunities that our local area has to offer for their future.
- Allowing cursing, disrespect and late work without consequences does not help to develop character. Either hold students to rules like deadlines, respectful behavior, and dress codes, or remove the rules. Otherwise, what are we communicating to our students?
- Need more discipline! Kids have no/very little consequences. Students should not be able to tell staff to F\*\*\* off. Students should be charged for breaking/vandalizing things. Kids throw things at lunch, are told to pick it up, and still don't. Teachers don't try because they are not supported by administration.
- If feel like we need to address our students' mental health. At the elementary level it is very difficult to fit in all academic content, especially when our students' social and emotional well- being is underdeveloped. Also, our EL student population continues to increase and there is not enough support for them.
- Hope we can eventually get back to more interactive experiences beyond the classroom to offer enrichment like we did with education field trips.
- Pay your teachers a competitive salary that aligns with the rest of the county. We spend a lot of money on sports, special ed is so under funded! We need more quality intervention curriculum.
- I would like to see some additional exploration of partnering with businesses and community organizations.
- I only hear what others tell me that is happening at the high school. I am not 100% sure of all of the classes offered or the opportunities for specific careers.
- I think communication should be enhanced with 4K programs. There was a situation at Heritage this year where a student brought a weapon to school, and a school wide notification went out to all grade levels (with the exception for 4K). I found out about it from a parent with an older children. Although my child attended Heritage in 4K and on school grounds during the incident, I was completely unaware of the situation until after the fact.

- The districts handling of education during the pandemic was not good. Many parents became disenchanted with public schools in De Pere as a result. Offer more dual-credit/concurrent enrollment opportunities for students. De Pere HS has limited options compared to schools in the Fox Valley (Neenah, Kimberly, Kaukauna).
- First, this survey should have a choice of something between agrees and disagrees with the statements. I feel much more ambivalent than the choices offered. I feel like this survey is intended to be used as a self-congratulatory tool without a sincere desire to find ways to improve. Also, there should be a simple way to note concerns about situations and teachers besides having to contact the administration and identify yourself and your child.
- More teacher development would be great!
- Could do more with understanding the kinds of careers and colleges (tech, community, university, liberal arts, etc) and helping students understand
- If feel there should be a policy of no cell phones in the classroom
- We all know the NFL players heart stopped a week after a booster. Yet your woke superintendant feels it right to allow De Pere Health's government agents come onto school grounds to offer up clot shot death vax. He tells he does so in the name of equity and not to worry because approval to get jabbed must be approved by parents. We have to go to a clinic in town to get my daughter help. This clinic has a waiting list of over 100 students. Why don't you use some of your resources you have and provide help for students in need.
- I know students have there flex and study hall but not all students will use it if there not pushed to using it. It would be nice if you had a list of different tutors in the area for parents to reach out to for help for there students who are struggling. I never liked to raise my hand for help in class as I was Embarrassed. Unfortunately there are many students that feel that way so they end up falling thru the cracks. Need more support for those that struggle.

- You shouldn't allow phones or social media in the classroom. Teachers should have a more active role in ensuring that kids are engaged in the classroom and should communicate any struggles with parents when they happen and not just at conferences. Some parents don't have the flexibility to attend conferences and have no way of knowing what is going on at school.
- I have had 7 kids in the district 4 have graduated from Depere, in the past it seemed as if my kids were held more accountable for behaviors, dress and academics. I believe as with most school districts Depere continues to lower it standards, allowing hats and hoods is one example and this starts a downward spiral that many of the surrounding school districts are on. Just look at Green Bay and the disfunction they have in their schools and you can see Depere slowly going down that same path. KEEP STANDARDS AND EXPECTATIONS HIGH, DONT LOWER THEM TO APEASE ANY GROUP OR TO GET A BETTER SCORE ON THE STATE REPORT CARD.
- Need more opportunities for high level learners to take in school college level classes. Also, need to add a car maintenance repair/engine class.
- I am unable to answer some of these questions as my only child currently in the district is in 2nd grade. I think the school board and district leaders need to improve communication with the community. Several board members have agreed that communication needs to be better, yet have not improved in recent years. I think our building leaders need to do a better job of living the "fly as one" motto that seems to have been adopted by the district. It truly feels as though there are too many silos in the district. and departments/activities looking out for their own interests, and not the better interests of the district.
- As with any school, there are some excellent teachers and some that could use improvement.
- There is too much racism that is allowed in the schools. Staff do not do enough to discourage it and there is no real consequence for blatant racism and homophobia in the schools. Our schools can't be a safe space until there is a top down initiative to call out racism, sexism, homophobia and xenophobia when it happens in the schools.

- I feel that the communications with parents are lacking in regards to when kids are being pulled out of class for non important issues
- The means by which the school district communicates with parents through email is a little absurd. Every email comes from the same email address and they specifically state which school or class it pertains to, it's sometimes hard to tell which. I have three students in the district at three different schools.

- The district should make it easier for parents to access the lesson plans and student books and assignments instead of placing all tge responsibility on the kids (especially grades 10 and under). It also would be nice if parents could elect to hold their children back a grade. We know our children and their struggles best and while the school can gift reasons and recommendations and prevent repeated hold backs, it's not good if our children wind up struggling for all the remainder of their years as a result, like my son currently is, because foundational skills were not mastered at a more appropriate time.
- My child is an A student. Teachers are impossible to meet with to discuss opportunities to challenge her. Teachers are behind on providing grades/ feedback. She's had teachers start crying in class, panic that students aren't ready for an AP exam in front of them and immediately give them the exam.Administration doesn't care
- The principal at Foxview Andy Bradford has been nothing but arrogant and smug to me and my husband. Such a shame in such an amazing district. He needs to be replaced.
- I wish there was more of an emphasis on outdoors and sustainability such as school gardens and outdoor classrooms.
- Career counseling seems to be spread thin from a staffing perspective.
- I think the expectations for students could be higher such as hard deadlines and not accepting late work. I know my kids slack a little bit because they know not all teachers are strict with that.
- De Pere would benefit from moving in the next century by diversifying their staff and making a more inclusive environment a priority. And by inclusive I mean seeking out diversity and making the schools a safe place for all (races, cultural backgrounds, etc)
- The kids have too many days off, early releases, and late starts throughout the year. I do not like that they need to go to school almost until mid June to get their days in. I feel like our kids are behind due to being off from the COVID pandemic and more should be done to get them caught up. I have a 5th grader that never learned to write in cursive. Also, why do they get so many retakes on exams and homework? We never had this as kids. I keep getting emails from a certain teacher that the entire class did poor on different exams or assignments. Maybe its a teacher problem and not a student problem. If the whole class is doing poorly, maybe the teacher is not explaining the subject matter well. I'm glad we are rating high as a school district overall, but I have several concerns.
- Please see previous comment.
- I think there is opportunity to review other districts to see what is working well. I have friends with children at Pulaski and Howard Suamico and frequently hear of things they are doing that I would expect a district like De Pere to also be doing.

- Idisagreed in the leadership area because for several year our school leadership has failed our youth and the tax payers. I have been to several of the building for events and have been very disappointed in how the facilities are being taken care of. I think a little more care should go into the brick and mortar than into all the sports fields. Additionally, I feel that a district that puts sports ahead of learning is destine to fail. I am not happy with the recent communication that my student "strongly should" take speed and strength courses every year. This suggestion makes student athletes feel pigeon holed into not taking courses that might help them prepare for life. I am guessing the percentage is very low for the amount of student athletes who move on to college and the pro's. Why are we making this such an important course? I would rather have more district backing for courses that teach life skills and allow a student to explore career options. Speed and strength is not a life skill!
- We have a wealth of resources available through the colleges in the area. Our son is in the TAG program at the Middle School, and we have been really happy to see those kids going to St. Norbert College for field trips and learning from the professors there. I think there is a lot of opportunity to have a stronger connection between the colleges and the K-12 schools.
- The website sucks very hard to read or find information lost as a freshman parent
- I believe USDD has wonderful educators. It would be nice if DPHS required personal finance for all students to graduate to lay some foundational work for all students no matter which path they choose.
- My opinion on a lot of the above statements I hold back on as I have not seen actual proof in either direction to agree or disagree. This survey is the only direct communication and platform that has been offered for my opinion. In looking at DePere's stateside ratings it is above many other school districts in the state and I commend them for this......but my overall opinion on our educational system is still marginal at best and there is definitely room for improvement.
- The district (and all school districts in the country) should provide free lunches for all students.
- I have good students that haven't made the cut for the TAG programs. They sometimes end up bored and could use more than what is provided in class.
- I think the district could look at expanding AP or DC options. I also think it is challenging for some students to fit in the classes they want or need at the high school level. I have heard of discussions to maybe do away with the 1st hour option and can say that limitation would affect my student and have me considering if they should attend elsewhere.
- Perhaps instead of looking at the taxpayers they need to look at community businesses for more funding with recognition to them.

- My response on the leadership is directed at the recent school board changes, which have me very concerned. I acknowledge this is outside of the District's power to control. Some people seem to be motivated by factors other than the best possible education for our students.
- Thank you!!
- The HS counselors have done an adequate job of helping my students get all the answers they need to think about their future. We as parents have had to do most of that. Their teachers have been way more informed and helpful than the counselors.
- My oldest is at the middle school, so I don't have high-school input yet, but so far i think we could have a LOT more community pride/involvement
- I do think the district is doing a good job in the academic preparation for life after high school. I just received notice that the math teachers are having ACT prep sessions before the juniors take the ACT....I absolutely love this and would love to see the prep sessions in other subject areas as well. I do think that the district can strive to add in more things like this...sometimes its the small things that add up to positive changes.
- We moved into the Depere school district for two main reasons. We have one student who in the Green Bay School system was gifted and talented, but the school system didn't have the proper support for him due to the number of struggling students. Our child entered the school system in Depere and initially was in the gifted and talented program in elementary school but just missed the mark even though he had high test scores for middle school. Now he is bored in school. Our other child is special needs and autistic. We went thru ALOT of hardships starting him in the district even after bringing in testing reports and teacher reports from the green bay school system. This year his teachers are amazing, but it took a full year to get the district to process this. The school system teaches to the average but struggles with those on the far ends of the variations. Depere seems to have strong supports for the athletics divisions, but I would like to see stronger support for the tech ed and hands on aspects of our working communities, reaching further into STEM type groups. There appears to be a start with this, but I feel it could be stronger. Earlier introduction of this to our children will help keep our community one that continues to grow into the future.
- My children are young (2nd grade and Kindergarten), so I do not yet have opinions of the long-term effects of their education.
- The past is our hinderance; we need to move forward and feel the leadership is in place to strike.

- In regards to a safe campus... my son attends Foxview and I feel like they are exposed to the public too much. It isn't a "closed" campus with open gates and there isn't a closed perimeter. When my son runs laps in Gym, he's running next to the road where anyone can see him... with all the latest gun violence, I feel like schools need to be more secure. Are the windows at Foxview bullet proof or hurricane proof?

- 1. Our district has a reputation for turning a blind eye to racism, homophobism, and bullying. Disciplinary measures need to be established, clearly communicated, and enforced. 2. The middle school needs more paraprofessionals to help with hallway behavior. 3. "Tracks" within the high school (engineering, arts, literature, sciences) could help students better plan their experience and not miss opportunities that often only benefit the community insiders who are "in the know".
- The school district is WOKE and more interested in liberal politics and the "global community" than the local community.
- Websites not very user friendly. My oldest two had Marcy as their counselor and she was terrible. Everyone knew it and nothing was done thankfully we had resources to figure it out.
- Would appreciate seeing more "teaming" of the community with the District, including how does the District measure itself, ie goals and metrics, and having this visible to the public.
- My son had a head injury to to recklessness of another child in high school sports & the bills were tremendous with no help from the school. However we received great support from the advisor & most faculty when his usual A grades started to slip fie to severe concussion symptoms that still affect him today 6 years later. One son had a severe injury of shoulder that ended up requiring major surgery to repair. The trainer from Aurora told him to "quit being a baby". It's just a "pulled muscle". I did inform Dr Shock. Very frustrating. The coaches told him to pitch at full speed on first day of practice is when it occurred. I teach for Bellin College. It's great to see the Highs School have a connection & the students take our NA classes. Again great support from the advisors when assistance needed.
- I think that the district in the past, when I had children going to school, put too much emphasis on going to college and not enough on the trade schools. Not sure if this has changed since 2009 but I think it should.
- We just moved to the district and have young children , so we don't know many specific details but know the district has a high reputation

- I'm not sure that all of these are true for all students. I think Melanie Brick does a great job connecting with the community as the district social worker, but I feel less connected to the principals and other leadership at the schools.
- Giving kids weeks/semester to make up missing assignments or re-do tests/exams is not realistic for after graduation. This does affect kids overall character.
- If ind the webpages for the schools difficult to find what I need.
- I have found that the leaders do not hold their teachers accountable to high standards. There are no expectations around having grading completed or grades/assignment entered into infinite campus. There are no expectations around CEU's, ie no one has any special knowledge or training on kids with ADHD. I have found that the needs and desires of the teachers are always put ahead of the needs of the students. This is the result of poor leadership.
- Leadership was sorely lacking through the COVID era. Leadership lacks inspiration and does not give me any confidence in the district.
- There needs to be more opportunities for students who just don't excel in the traditional school setting. There also needs to be more special education help. Teachers aren't meeting IEP minutes successfully. There also needs to be more help for kids that want to go into trades or the work force after school. And more help for kids that are academically low, but not low enough to receive intervention because there's "too many kids with lower scores." As a parent that has a kid on the bubble, I'm so frustrated. I need more help for my kid to succeed but I can't get it because my kid "isn't low enough" to receive services because other kids are "lower" achieving and my kid is not in special Ed.
- The use of electronics, chromebooks for learning is too much. The kids are now struggling with being able to write, spell and be effective communicators due to the amount of chrome book time. Also, "workshop" at Foxview unfortunately doesn't allow students to work on homework during that time but instead has them doing iready or other chromebook use unless they are being pulled for extra help. I wish students who would like to work on their homework during this time would be allowed to do so. It would be great to see more diversity within De Pere School District or at least finding ways to teach and learn about diversity would be great. I know there has been more of this recently and that is appreciated! I feel at the elementary and intermediate level principal involvement could be stronger. It would be great to see the administration (principals) at school events, supporting their students. I cannot speak for schools other than Heritage and Foxview, but Heritage in particular.

- I wish to explain the areas I marked "disagree" in this section. High Expectations: Our grading scale has gone DOWN since I started teaching here! In addition we (the high school and middle school in particular) have a policy of late work and retesting that does not develop good character in our students. Some students are so focused on grades that they do not value the learning and this leads to cheating. Developing student character: Well let's go along with the cheating, teachers are tasked with creating a new assessment for cheating students! From my point of view and that of my children there is no real punishment for cheating and they witnessed it all too often in the high school. For teachers it is a major time headache to call a student out for cheating and then many families and administrators do not back the teacher fully! The current character strong program used in the NEST sessions is cumbersome and complicated AND teachers do not get time to plan for this additional prep period along with their normal course planning. Also, character education as a stand alone is much more difficult than if it is incorporated into existing curriculum or another structure. Some building level administrators seem to be focused on "leading" or making sure they have a portfolio for their next stop in administration beyond the current one that should be the focus of their time and energy. Administrators NEED to be managing student behaviors in a more productive and supportive way. Sometimes staff do not feel as though their point of view OR the classroom learning environment is considered when managing behaviors. The amount of disrespect and insubordination that is not fully addressed by administration makes some staff feel not valued and fosters a belief that the "office" will not support a staff member so why send the student to the office and feel more beat down when the student returns with no resolution. We have a curriculum director (soon to be 2) and many others who are focused on curriculum, perhaps our building administrators should be focused on student behaviors.
- Could notify family's when they are going to have yellow flag in the morning so it's easier for drop off in the morning
- Teaches to the top. Substandard support for average and below average learners. Substandard support from Special Ed for students on IEP's or with behavioral challenges.
- The building principals need to be more physically present at student events, particularly the principals at Fox View and Heritage where my children attend. They are never present at after school events such as band and choir concerts. The communication skills are lacking from both leaders.
- The new website is not very user friendly.
- Preparation of kids for their future should also include options besides the typical 4-5 year college experience. More emphasis on trades and developing life skills instead of other class requirements that will have no impact on a child's future. Four years of a foreign language that will never be used seems a bit illogical.
- The counseling department could offer more direction to each student. Especially for families going through the high school for the first time. Not a huge fan of changing teachers at semester in the high school. Have been disappointed with student often getting alternate choices for classes.

- -Our children come home frequently talking about "safety issues" within the middle school & lack of school personnel ability to manage it. There have also been situations where teachers or substitutes have reportedly cried because of a difficult student causing issues in the class & interrupting learning environment which is concerning to us. -Listening to board meetings it appears that decisions seem to be made from those who complain the most. -Unfortunately it seems that if your child is not one that excels, comes from money or is a disruption in class that they are just a number.
- Now that more information about Covid has come out. It should be noted that all School Board members, staff, superintendent, etc understand that Covid protocols that were put in place were overbearing and unnecessary.
- Our district is unique in that we don't offer foreign language district-wide until middle school. Hard to imagine that the district is truly fulfilling their mission to, "prepare all learners to be successful and contributing members in our global society" when the only language emphasized through the first 9 years of each students journey in education is English.
- As mentioned above, providing more CCIHS classes would allow students the opportunity to get more college credits instead of AP classes where there is no guarantee
- I believe our building level administrators and the police liaison officer need to be more visible in our hallways and lunch room on a regular basis. They need to be holding our kids to a higher standard of behavior in regards to respect for each other and toward staff. They need to be holding kids and parents more accountable for students actions and behavior that cross the legal line, and the moral and ethical line. Teachers need to feel supported with classroom management of student behaviors with more accountability toward the student with the consequences for their actions.
- I don't believe we put a priority on meeting the needs of our students and families of color. Creating an equatable school district has not been as important as high test scores and rankings.
- I have come to understand that there are a few administrators that do not complete their job with the passion and dedication necessary for the position. When students do not know who their principal is, that is a concern.
- I'm not aware of the process for "feedback" from the district/school board... I know of social events that have taken place via the Facebook account, however I'm not sure of school board decisions through that manner. I do not go on the website often to check out the school board minutes there. The community right now seems pretty split on many issues within the district, so it's hard to say. With new leadership (and more to come with new curriculum directors), it's hard to know at this point if we are headed in the right direction. Only time will tell. I don't think it's the job of the school to "develop students' character", rather to foster the development already started by parents.

- The low scores for academics and development is based on my own child. I asked multiple times for schools to consider my child extra testing for a learning disability. I have gotten the run around all the way up to high school. I believe in high school they only concentrate on the scores and not if there are other possible issues.
- All schools have a big job after covid. We all know that was a huge set back. As far as college, the school should help but I think in many ways parents are expecting more and more of the schools. Parents need to take more responsibility for their kids behavior, goals, grades, college direction, etc etc. Too easy to blame schools and teachers when parents could assist more.
- Too many options to avoid placing responsibility onto the students as they progress through high school to prep them for college. Oftentimes, the college culture is a shock to them and they are not prepared for having all of the responsibility on their shoulders. The summer school program is a joke- the students only have to go as long as it takes them to complete their missing work-they are not required to spend the whole duration of "summer school". My son now does not see summer school as a problem if he has to go because he was there for a day, not the whole designated summer school time. If they students were forced to do added projects and required them to stay the whole duration of summer school, it would give them a motivation to do better doing the school year instead of having to use their summer on doing things that should have already been doing during the designated time in the school year. Do the teachers want the parents really involved, or do they want to put more responsibility on the student? There is not a consistency with that amongst the staff. Some want high parent involvement, some want more to be put on the student. Which is it?
- Slaps on the wrist for sexual misconduct on students due to fear of Woke. Some teachers just continue to use same plans and don't hand out worksheets because it's more work for them and it's not graded. Nothing for parents to use to help student.
- I have been very impressed with the De Pere school district. The one thing I would like to see more of at the high school is career education. I realize that there is a lot of curriculum to be covered, but career education needs to take more of a priority so that students have a better sense of not just being prepared for college in general but prepared for a direction to take within college.
- Are we okay with students going to tech colleges or apprenticeships? Are we okay with students joining the workforce? Or do we only see 4-year college as the correct option or the best option? The reality is that college is not the best option for everyone. For the majority of our students, yes, it is. However, what about the students who don't fit that mold? Do they feel welcome here too? Are their differences accepted? Or do we only care what their standardized test scores are so that we can look good on state report cards? I have been to board meetings and met the superintendant. His agenda seems state report card focused. Is our ultimate goal to have the best state report card or to meet EVERY student where they are at and support them how THEY need to be supported?

- Although the district keeps a safe and secure campus in general, there are many minority groups that don't feel safe even within the community due to racism and homophobia. This needs to be addressed before we can say that De Pere is a 'safe' placed to live and learn.
- No communication from teachers to parents feels very distant. No parent teacher conference or willingness to meet
- Some of these questions are extremely hard to gauge at my children's ages.
- My girls are not open ld enough to know about being provided preparations for their future
- Student accountability is lacking
- Expectations and support levels drive towards average performance, from both above and below. Excellence is not expected nor rewarded in students nor teachers.
- Our district needs help with dyslexia. There are tools available, for free, and it needs to be utilized.
- I believe our district does not hold children accountable for there actions, and along with that the staff at the schools. There is a long history of bullying, and treating people different if they are different.

Let me first say that the majority of educators that we have encountered over the years have been absolutely amazing and they definitely do not get enough credit. Being an educator is HARD and I cannot even begin to imagine what it is like to do their job on a daily basis. Kudos and many thanks to them because I don't think that many people understand what they do for our kids and the struggles that they encounter. We have had kids in the district for 12+ years so I feel like I have a pretty good handle on the district. Here are some of my thoughts based on our direct personal experience, as well as conversations that we have had and continue to have with other parents and residents in the district. The students were recently given a survey on how they feel about school. It was explained to them that this survey was anonymous and would be kept confidential. However, USDD staff were pulling students into their office based on their answers. Considering this, why tell the kids that their answers are anonymous if they are going to be called out based on what they put down? I can certainly understand if there were extenuating circumstances, such as school and student/staff safety, but you lose trust with the kids when you say one thing and then do another. You also put them in a position where they more than likely are not going to answer honestly the next time and will just put down what they feel the district thinks is the best answer so they are not singled out again. Is that what we want? Just surveys based on dishonest answers as long as it makes the school look better? I, as well as many others in the community, feel that De Pere focuses WAY too much on sports and not enough on education at a high school level. The amount of money put into the athletic program and facilities vs. other areas of education is both alarming and appauling. Not every student is interested in sports and those who do not participate in sports should have equal opportunities that are not currently provided due to funding issues in certain areas. That isn't right. School is supposed to be about education first. Sheer example: Take a look at your tech-ed and agricultural programs vs. say what opportunities Denmark is offering. We are talking NIGHT AND DAY difference and they are a small town community. Is it the teachers faults? No. If you do not have the resources allocated to you to make the program better or offer different opportunities, the blame is on the district and not the teacher. My husband and I were also less than thrilled to see that kids are now REQUIRED to take speed and strength if involved in a HS sports program vs. being allowed to take a course during that time that they were interested in. Instead, they are FORCED to take a class even if they want to participate in a sport for fun. I think we are sending the wrong message to kids that it is about winning, being the best, and that sports are equally as important as their studies. Is that really what we want for our kids? Not all students are going to go on to play professionally. This is part of the reason why the losses and injuries are so tough for them. They feel like there is a standard and that standard is constantly increasing and they will never be good enough. They are taking it personally and for some of them, it shows. The social and economic pressures in life are hard enough on kids. Do we really need to add to that? I am also concerned with the fact that students are not taught responsibilty and time management skills as well as how to utilitze these skills effectively. So many students are entering the work force thinking that these do not apply to them because they were given an exhausting amount of chances to complete something in school. That is not how the real world works. We are setting these kids up for failure by allowing them WEEKS or longer to turn an assignment in with zero consequences. It is completely understandable if the extension is due to absence or illness, but when it is based on lack of effort on their part, it teaches them nothing. It leaves them with a feeling of entitlement when they enter the

workforce and employers aren't going to respond well to it. Not to mention, I would hate to be that teacher who has to then grade something from weeks prior because a student just didn't turn it in. I would also like to respecfully and specifically address the fact that USDD needs to refrain from pushing a student into a path that they are not comfortable with. Especially if the student has expressed disinterest several times. This is NEVER okay and should be stopped immediately throughout schools everywhere. According to the kids that I have spoken with, Certain (not all) USDD counselors and staff have a way of making kids feel like they have to attend a 4-year program or they are never going to amount to anything. The reality? Not every student wants to or needs to go to a 4year college and it needs to be explained that starting a career via technical college, 2 year program, or workforce program is perfectly fine and leads to great paying and much needed careers as well. Trades and other career opportunities that do not require a 4-year program, or offer on-the-job schooling/training should be talked about MORE. The students should have all opportunities presented to them in an equal manner before making a decision on what they would like to proceed and prepare for. The same goes for YA programs, which should be their choice. They shouldn't have teachers or program administrators pressuring them to do it because they get a kickback if they do. That is a definite red flag that your funds and the appropriation of power is being utilitzed incorrectly if departments are that hungry for funding. Listen to your students. Thankfully, we were assigned an amazing counselor who respects and acknowledges students chosen paths. I am grateful for this person and appreciate the honesty and respect shown to my child. As far as social media, it is great to have a presence, but you should probably answer questions asked or just turn off commenting as well. The website. Oh the website. The website has become my nemesis. It used to be so easy to navigate with the attendance number right on the front page. Now, not so much. Make it easy for parents. Put these items under the parents tab. Why does it not show the emails of the staff anymore? Drives me crazy. LOL Take it for what you will, but this is honest feedback from a parent with students in the district. I know the above seems like a lot, but I am not bashing the district. There are a lot of positives that are praised all of the time and I think that the negatives or areas of improvement need to be taken into consideration as well. Thank you for your time and consideration.

- The policy that students cannot be called by any name other thatn their given name is discriminatory and exclusive. It creates a community in which not all students are safe and valued. On another note, the DPHS couseling department needs imrovement when it comes to advising students about post high school opportunities. Three of the four counselors there are ineffective and need to get it together.
- There tends to be a very heavy focus towards college beyond high school which I think is unfortunate. The majority of kids are better suited towards the trades or maybe technical school, but college is the primary push I always hear about from my kids who hear it at school.

As we attempt to close the gap, we water down what we can give to the others because of the resources needed to manage behaviors of students who, quite frankly, should be provided a different learning environment.

- eliminate nonsense like common core, NGSS, CRT WEL
- My opinion is that the school needs to expand their tech Ed offers and space to reflect more trade and skilled workforce.
- -The school could really do some great things by partnering with our community leaders. -Life skills should be at the forefront of these students. We should make it a priority that these kids learn real life skills that they will need as a community member.
- We lack diversity in our staff, kids don't get to see people of color in roles of leadership.
- Initial perception of the new superintendent is a marked improvement from the past.
- Mr. Herlache is an amazing leader at Dickinson Elementary school. He is visible to students and parents. He is easy to communicate with and generous with his time. We are so pleased with the staff and leadership at Dickinson.
- I continue to hear from former students and parents that the retest policy at the high school does not help students prepare for college. In fact, some believe it makes our kids lazy because they simply find out what is on the test and then take the retest after putting in a minimual amount of effort.
- I think that teachers need to be more flexible with learning styles. In the real world we are all different ONE size doesn't fit all. It seems in school there is ONLY one way to be successful. I really struggle with that approach. Just because you are not a good test taker, doesn't mean you are not smart. Being able to individualize your teaching approach would enable all students to do their best. Maybe offering a couple of ways to "prove" you know the material would be great. Maybe offering a project, an essay and traditional test as options. NEED to get rid of phone usage in the high school. It is distracting and many students are so addicted it interferes with their learning and those arounds them. I believe they have the correct approach in the middle school.
- I think the District does a good job for the 80% of "average" students, but I don't think there are enough opportunities for gifted and talented students. This goes along with pushing expectations for students. It seems like the District is fine as long as a majority of students go to a local state or tech school. There seems to be very little push to achieve more than this.
- It is hard to say that the district "develops students' character" when I recently saw that a board member was posting indicating that we need to make sure the district doesn't become "woke"- as in, we will make sure that students don't get taught about diversity and social emotional learning...very disappointing.
- To be completely honest I have concerns about the new superintendent. I have had 2 interactions and I have been nonplussed this far. I sincerely hope it is just a weak first impression.

- I am disappointed in the administrative leadership at Foxview. There is little to no communication with parents and I often find out about incidents and events directly from my child instead of leadership.
- The IED staff for 6th grade at Foxview was terrible, they did not follow the goals set by the 5th grade teachers, changed the goals without telling us, and never informed us of a couple issues they were seeing at school with my daughter.
- I think there could be some more work to help build character and get kids engaged in the community within the classroom. It seems alot of that is an extracurricular option. I am curious about how the teachers are reviewed and ensure ongoing high quality teaching. My kids have had +/- experiences based on the teachers. Some teachers seem burned out and others truly seem to be engaged in the students learning.
- While the district is doing a great job in educating students, I believe there are always ways to improve.
- The Green Bay school district has so many more opportunities. The rise program that offer the students enough credits to graduate high school with a two year college degree plus offers first generation college students the next two years of college free. So many more opportunities for all students not just the highly advanced students. Very frustrating.
- Newsletters and websites focus mostly on sports. Other extra curriculars are either briefly mentioned or not mentioned at all.
- I think the website could definitely use a refresher. Make it easier to view lunch menus, clothing shop and events. It is not very user friendly and found old information on the website that is no longer valid.
- We have lost the building of virtue within our children. What is education without virtue? We can produce highly intelligent people who cannot understand truth and say no to themselves when it is right. This is not a problem with teachers as a whole but the values of the public education system. Parents are informed in many ways about the education of their children but not in those that most matter. I feel that the academics of education have taken a backseat to ideologies and propaganda. What will these children grow up to be and what of their children? I plan to homeschool my youngest three children.
- I would love to see more school pride/spirit. It seems that the other teams/fans always have far more pride/chants/gear/excitement when it comes to games and events. I think cheerleaders, etc..... might help a bit.
- No cell phone policy at school!
- I have found that communication has been one-sided in a split family situation. I have had administrators tell me in an email that they will not talk to me.
- Information will come out what door to get your child or drop off but there is no map on the website to know where that door is at the school.

- Certain kids such as at-risk, non-academically interested need more options such a AUTO SHOP or other such hands on where they can be motivated. My nephew would have loved to work on cars there, and never would have dropped out.
- It's difficult to find what I'm looking for on the website. I wish the school academic calendar was posted on the homepage. More activities should be listed on the activity calendar. More social media posts.
- I marked the "Preparing students for education after High School" as a disagree because of the limited amount of dual-credit options at the high school. While I understand that student can participate in ECCP/Start College Now programs, most of dual credit at the high school is contingent upon students passing an AP test with a score of 4/5. Why aren't there CAPP offerings?
- My child has had many issues with bullying. The school doesn't appear to have any repercussions for individual problem children. I've also had many complaints about the math program and support. My student doesn't receive the support they need from the teachers they gave in this area. It's hard to get one in one time.
- Please offer spring break times earlier in calendar year Combine early release/ late start date not one full day off on a Monday or Friday to make it easier for dual working parents
- Of my 3 children, 2 have ADHD. We have requested special attention but only received pushback and no help. My oldest is now in highschool and is really struggling and it's affecting his mental health as well. Sports seems to be the must important priority for this school district along with families that have higher incomes and are full families instead of single parent households.
- Both of my children have been involved in classroom situations where unruly students take priority over the education of my child. Having the patient and well behaved children put second to the children who need extra attention with outbursts and bad behavior is frustrating. One child was made to sit in the hallway while an unruly student had a tantrum that they let play out. I learned this from my child as well. I should have been communicated this situation by the school. My children have also heard of other kids sleeping with no repercussions. This sets a bad example for others.
- Some of my child's teachers have significant political bias that IS discussed at class; this is WRONG! Talented and gifted needs to be revamped. I pulled my son OUT of De Pere as he was not being challenged. Help me understand why all of the tax money is helping the children NOT at grade level? I for a fact know my son is not the only child that excels in certain areas. It's terrible we are not focused on developing all children's talents.

- "Some" teachers, not all, really do not like doing extra work to help kids who struggle in school. It is an inconvenience for them when a child has an IEP. It is very obvious the difference because I have had a child with and IEP and one without. Bullying is a huge issue at the high school. I realize this is a hard one to address, but at times feel like the school looks the other way. Apprenticeships are offered, but only if the parents do the work to find them. The school did not assist with this. But once we found a company that would do an apprentice with our child then they helped get it set up. I worry for the child who doesn't have the resources, but would do well in this program. Guidance office needs more employees, kids often can't find time to meet to discuss things. Flex program needs to be revamped. They just changed to not letting the kids request meetings and having certain subjects on certain days. This doesn't work either because if they only need help in one subject, they have to wait a whole week at times to get it during flex.
- Stop randomly drug testing all students and require drug testing for extra curricular activities.. that is not your place to teach a child that is trustworthy that they are kor trustworthy and guilty until proven innocent when they provided zero reason or suspicion of drug use. That is a parents decision to be made and waste of tax payers money.
- Not sure there is much preparation with students for education after high school. My son is a junior and I haven't heard him talk about any preparation.
- Educate students about diversity and inclusion
- My child had a teacher who did most of her lessons pre recorded on videos, and sat at her desk while the students watched them. My child didn't do very well in that class and made comments that he felt like his teacher was detached from teaching and it wasn't engaging without her involvement. I recommend teachers limit using prerecorded video lessons, and engage students by hands on learning and being involved and available to them.
- De pere needs to adapt their communication style. My email is so overrun I miss so much information. There is duplication sometimes triplication of emails and information and then sometimes I miss theme days at schools because I have one child in elementary and another in high school. It is so difficult to keep relevant information with the antiquated ways the school district communicates.
- I personally do not like the shift away from the basics. Also the lack of homework is very concerning across the board. Once students get into Foxview there is little to no follow up unless specifically asked.
- The DePere District should be doing more to embrace and empower LGBTQ students. I don't believe the DePere District is doing enough to support a student's gender identity and that lack of support is causing mental health issues for students.

- Recently there was an incident with a bus in which it simply slid in ditch with a slight lean, & things were blown out of proportion by social media and a few students who decided to post erroneous information. I am assuming they were held accountable for their actions. Lots of resources were expended that should not have been; perhaps may even have been needed elsewhere. This was directly a result of students reaction, which many rules were broken & yet if one would only know the media version, it would seem this was minor and bus driver was left to be the scapegoat. Hopefully, appropriate disciplinary action is done. If not, perhaps it will become similar procedure to the Salem witch trials, with word of children being "blessed" vs whomever would stand in their way. Of course, if that is districts plan, then it is well on the way to success.
- Regards to "safe" buildings in regards to being locked during school hours, etc, De Pere is safe. In regard to students feeling safe, I feel De Pere has work to do. Students in the minority due to race, ethnicity, gender identity or other forms of othering are not feeling safe.
- High quality teachers for sure but some of the staff leave a bit to be desired.
- The level of teaching staff is quite varied, leaving the quality question difficult to answer. Having high expectations for students can mean a lot of different thing. This question could not be fairly ansered. Preparing students for college or post high school education could use a lot of developement. Staff does not connect with the true needs for quality information to students or parents.
- I disagree about Communications communicating with me effectively. I have 3 kids in 3 different schools in the district. It's really difficult to decipher which email is from each school. Sometimes I can tell from the email address but hey, everything is getting lost in emails because I'd like there to be an easier way to identify which school in the district the actual info in coming from. I cannot remember all 15 total teachers for my kids. You know?
- I love the new initiative to bring cultural experiences and understanding to our students. The district itself is not very diverse and so providing students the opportunity to learn about people and cultures outside of their own is so important to making them well rounded citizens who will be successful in the world. I hope to see continued financial support devoted to those initiatives.
- Ifeel that an area of growth is to expand our facilities in terms of improving tech. ed areas, etc. I also hope that some of our local business partners could "pony up" some funds for those facilities. Companies like Belmark should look to invest in those areas like Ariens did in Brillion.
- GBAPS does a much better job of promoting career paths and District options to students. DPHS has a trades academy but not many know about it and it is often thought of for those students that are struggling rather than a beneficial first-choice career
- They are not preparing students for after high school when some coaches are strongly encouraging speed and strength vs education to separate you out when applying for college. They won't understand 8 semesters of speed and strength

- I think the level of communication is appropriate (weekly school newsletter via email is about all I need).
- The way the comment was worded not sure if I agree meat that I feel the expectations are too high. I do not feel that way. I think the expectations for students are exactly on point with the way of today's world.
- The high school in particular has let the kids sit on their phones all day long, the way they prepare the kids at the middle school by allowing them to re-take tests and quizzes does not help prepare them for the future at all. Open note exams is not realistic to prepare for college. Some students meet with counselors to help with class selections while others do not. Some teachers are way better than others and the poor ones turn even the best of students off from school. There should be more accountability and communication. I realize most parents can't handle hearing that their kid might be a problem these days but we really aren't doing our kids any favor with letting them get away with everything.

- Middle school needs more work on engaging students in becoming accepting of differences
- Your playground supervision at recess for elementary schools is inferior and I am not comfortable that my child is safe or not being bullied on a daily basis.
- no cell phones in the class room
- In general, our experiences in the district have been good. Our 8th grader has had some amazing teachers in his time at Heritage, Foxview, and the Middle School (some weren't as good, but that's true anywhere).
- The District can reasonably tout high achievement scores on standardized measures of achievement. However, curricular offerings are extremely traditional in nature and cater to these publicly facing scores. The District is effective in developing curricular offerings that cater nearly exclusively to college/university bound students. As a result, USDD can boast of sending students to reputable institutions of higher learning. However, students can be left behind because of the Districts' inability to keep an eye toward innovation. The District boasts very few innovative, student-centered learning opportunities for its students.
- One concern that I have is the behavior that is sometimes permitted in the classrooms. It seems that sometimes rude or disruptive behaviors are not dealt with in such a way as to put an end to those behaviors.
- The individual teachers have been good about communicating with us regarding our children. The district itself, namely vice principal and principal have not. There have been a few issues of which we were not made aware of other than by our children. They said individuals also seem annoyed and do not appreciate our feedback.
- Lets weed out the underperforming teachers. Effective leadership should be catching this.

- Twitter does not seem to cover all of the sports and other activities. The heavier attended sports are represented, but all sports should be. As a community member I'd also like to hear more about the volunteer work happening within the community that involves our students. Hours and hours are poured into helping others, and it would be great to hear more about KEY club, Dream team, blood drives, etc. I question the need for the random drug testing that is done. Students miss class, it is a "gotcha" mentality, and other districts in our area do not seem to do this. Could we use that time and the funds for something better?
- During Covid I did not think you were headed in right direction compared to west de pere who had more freedoms of choice. The district clearly went against a HUGE MAJORITY of parent opinions. The district still has a lot to prove to us.
- My child is in elementary school and I did not feel that I could answer career readiness questions.
- In 21-22 school year I feel we were given more info in the newsletters regarding whether or not kids would have lunch on early release days/ late start. This year there was confusion. Some email links to describe "steps to take" are there wrong links for the email.
- The district is working on prepping high school students for life after high school. I feel that more work needs to be done here. More educating of parents needs to be done regarding different opportunities for life of students after high school. And to the students for the opportunities that exist for them outside of 4 year education.
- I would like to see De Pere schools show more inclusivity of different cultures and values. Oneida nation dancers were great this year! love to see more of cultural celebrations, more about Black history month, etc. in elementary schools.
- If feel like mental health needs to be addressed more often and with every student. Maybe during 2 nest/flex times per month. We need more help for counselors who are swamped with college planning and course planning. I think academic eligibility needs to be looked at on a case by case basis.
- The support at some of the schools have been phenomenal. Others not so much.
- I think the school is over crowded. The security of the school is a huge concern and also when you have that many children, there is a closeness that gets lost.

  Much less one on one. I also think that there could be updates in classes offered. In this changing world are we still focusing on the right things?
- I sometimes wonder if my child is allowed to just be a kid in your district. Education is important, but I want educators to buy in to my child for their character and not just how well they attain knowledge. We can hold elementary school children to high standard and allow them to be kids as well. I feel like sometimes we need to realize we aren't just made to just be a contribution to a work force.

- One of the strengths of this district is a very experienced staff. We often get little to no input on decisions being made. What makes it even more frustrating is the way the administration acts like we have a voice, but does what they want anyways. The staff shouldn't control administration, but too many decisions are made without considering their impact on staff.
- I think there is not enough communication between the schools. My children attend Heritage but this fall I heard by word of mouth, about online bullying/threats happening at Foxview. I would have preferred to hear about it from the school district. Many families have children at the different grade level schools. Kids talk, siblings talk, kids hear what goes on at home. I would have liked to been prepared to talk to my younger elementary kids if they had heard about it at school.
- De Pere has become a "WOKE" school district. It's one thing to discuss inclusivity and tolerance, but it's quite another to make them watch only CNN as their news source or deduct their grade over their non-woke opinion. I've not heard of one kid that hasn't been bullied and staff has not made any measures to stop it. It's hard to go to teachers when the teachers are the ones doing the bullying.
- I'm unsure of the high school preparedness for careers and higher education. My own children haven't reached that age. I do feel that there is room for growth in experiential learning, student led projects/learning, responses to correction, and a push to challenge and change for some staff who has settled into the same worksheets/time fillers that they've used for a long time.
- Too focused of academics and athletics. Not enough focus on the Whole Child
- for the most part you have high-quality tieachers. some in the ag education i would strongly disagree on. especially FFA teacher
- Fix the violence in the schools and learn to be compliant with IEP's you are breaking thr law on a regular basis
- Have a better bus line, Bought my house because they said the bus picks up there. Instead I have to walk a block and stand in the freezing cold to get my son on the bus. Last year they did pick up and drop off in front of the house but not this year. The bus is frequently late and/or doesn't show at all and they never send a text notifying you like they are supposed to. Less teacher work days and being closed on holidays all the other schools are instead.
- Add an IB program at the high school level.
- $\blacksquare$  Great teachers thus far. Not a lot of presence on social media.
- I think board meetings should be accessible online.
- I'm so proud of the Teachers that have kids that need extra attention.
- Need more foreign language selections

- I believe with the trend in education, my greatest concern is maintaining a positive work culture, supporting teachers financially and in the classroom. You see greater mobility within the workforce, even during a school year. Our family was impacted by one of our child's teachers leaving the district mid-year. I was not happy with the solution of filling the position with two separate people, one who was not even a trained teacher and another from outside of the district and unfamiliar with the district's curriculum. I want highly qualified teachers to remain in the district and to stay around for many years. The district needs to remain competitive in pay and benefits to attract the best. Strong building leadership, maintaining a strong education by making smart curricular choices, supporting staff by providing training in the curriculum and best practices, and having a strong culture is important to a thriving workforce which ultimately impacts students.
- At the elementary school, my kids were lucky to have exceptional teachers who challenged them at their level. I also saw a lot of support for math and reading intervention given to other students. At Foxview and the middle school, they weren't challenged as much. The school district seems to teach to the middle. If you are at grade level or above grade level, you do not receive as much challenge or help. Some friends kids were just at grade level and left to struggle until the deficit was hard to recover from. Even when identified with disorders based on neurological testing, the parents had to fight more than they should for any support. Other parents provided our family with information on classes at the high school level so we could help our kids plan their course plan each year. Students need to be proactive and schedule meetings with high school counselors and then sometimes don't get a chance to talk to them. There should be proactive meetings with the counselor every year with each student that is on their case load. Even small group meetings during flex would be an improvement. The junior planning meeting in the spring of their junior year is too late. Communication needs to improve to families on apprenticeship information, colleges that come to visit, clubs the students can participate in, and more. Parents have a hard time finding this information to encourage their students. I understand encouraging student independence, but communication with parents needs to improve to produce a better balance..

## No suggestion

- Interesting that we were told you needed certain classes to go into certain programs, prerequisites, yet this year the class (small engines) allowed freshMEN, perhaps it because it was a lady that wanted to be in there? She had to prove it. The discrimination in this department incredible and unseen and in addressed when confronted.
- Elementary playground supervision is insufficient and appears to lack proper training.

- Guidance counselors are not counselors, there are strictly in place these days for student scheduling, which is frustrating. They are not qualified to support students in crisis or daily life issues (social media pressure, friend drama, homelessness, poverty, abuse/neglect, suicide, step-families, divorce, etc). Would be a great idea for districts to hire both career counselors AND pyschologists/social workers to have on staff.
- I don't agree with teaching/curriculums regarding: -Critical Race Theory/equity Teach the good, bad and ugly sides of history. It is important for students to learn from the past so mistakes can be prevented in the future. Historical facts should not be changed to be politically correct. -Transgender/gender identity This is not appropriate for any school district to embark on! This should be a family responsibility, not the school districts. -The use of preferred pronouns Kids can quickly become targets for bullying when they are asked what their preferred pronoun is. Sexual orientation is nobody else's business! -Social/emotional curricula It sounds nice, but again it is a disguise for what it really is pushing a specific agenda. -Liberal or one-sided political view points -Students should be encouraged to come to their own conclusions regarding political preferences. Let's keep free speech free, so students are not "shut down" because they have a different viewpoint than the teacher.
- I do not think we hold kids accountable for their actions. We lower the bar and then when they don't meet that, we lower it again. Teachers are asked to do more and students are asked to do less.
- I would encourage the district to strongly consider foreign language programs in the elementary schools. We are missing the opportunity to teach children another language at what is referred to as "prime language acquisition age." I believe that this is a "miss" for USDD.
- I feel the the teacher/staff in the district do not have enough training or know how to work with children with needs and/or challenging behaviors. It seems that the only thing the that district trains the staff for is an active threat (which is important too) but also need to know how the work with children and/or recognize children that have needs/behaviors. I have a son that is in the district. He is high functioning autistic. We have had a hard time to get the school teachers/staff the last two years to understand his needs and for them to meet his needs. Every time we would suggest something we alway felt push back from the staff. This is were the district staff need more training.
- Would love to see continued focus on making the district an educational leader "for all". Inclusivity and welcome recognition of societal evolution, changing demographics. Progressive focus will best set this community up for success in developing future community members and contributive leaders.
- Would encourage the Superintendent to offer coffee hours once a month to offer opportuniites for residents to share thoughts and conversations. Also encourage the suprintendent to recognize the key parent leaders in each school that have been active parts of PTOs and Parent Groups as they have been fully engaged in the school and may have great input

- The website could be easier to navigate. It's a bit difficult to find information on the school website.
- There could be more support by having more para professionals in classrooms. I have classes with many students with disabilities that would greatly benefit from support, but do not have it available to them.
- Due to our recent change in superintendent, I did not offer an opinion on your leadership question. I believe in the past our superintendent did not embrace a vision of any great length. I hope our leadership now, and perhaps by the survey, has put an emphasis more on our vision.
- We moved to the area this summer. De Pere High School is hands down the best school our daughter has been to. See previous comment.
- My kids are at the HS level and have had some wonderful teachers. I will say they have had a few who have admitted to the class they do not have teaching degrees but instead had degrees in something else. I would be cautious with hiring too many teachers like that. My kids come home and know the difference. They have told me they found these teachers tests and outlines on line. Also they both have said these teachers have trouble "teaching" the content to kids who do not understand it. I have had doctors at my job say anybody can teach. That statement is infuriating and insulting to the dedicated, amazing people who have dedicated a career to it. It's a special skill to be able to teach something for the entire class to understand. Sometimes that means doing the same problem 3 different ways so it clicks.
- Ifeel that the website is lacking in that there is little to no information. There are so many times that I've tried to look for an event and have found that there is nothing on the calendar for said event. I generally find that I end up trying to get to different places within the website when searching for information but I continue to get re-routed back to the same places and it's a frustrating cycle. I try not to go to the website whenever possible but try to get back to any school messenger emails or newsletters. I have found the website to be of little aid in getting any answers to questions that I have had to search for. The Facebook page seems to be more of a cheerleader for the school than a place to find quality information about what is happening.
- I am unsure on how to answer the questions. We are relatively new to the district so the only things I know is what my child tells me what is happening at school.
- With working in the district, I see the kids that are falling behind and worry about them. At what point do some of these kids get the extra help they need? (some are getting the help, but some seem to be left behind)
- It hink we can do a better job engaging business and community members, but I think that means we need to allow ourselves to be a bit more vulnerable than we have been.

- Look at Pulaski's updated football stadium. Funded by grants from the community. They also, like other schools, have advertising from de pere businesses in their football program, assuming that when other teams play there they have advertising from other teams businesses. De Pere has to get smart and creative with their fundraising. Not sure how we don't have anything sponsored by Festival foods when their HQ is in De Pere. We need to employ a fundraiser, Grant writer etc
- Please continue to be open and progressive.
- Regarding student culture: There is a perception that De Pere School District is not diverse and not welcoming to diverse populations. I work in higher ed and have heard this from former students of the district. My son who is a DPHS student has also mentioned this.
- I would like to see more career and college ready courses. Especially career readying for non degree careers like mechanics and trades
- UW Green Bay has an amazing program for High School students, Rising Phoenix. Kids can graduate High School AND have an Associate's Degree at the same time if they make it through the program. Many school districts in Wisconsin have joined this program including Green Bay and many rural districts. De Pere is an exception. Our son would qualify and this could really kick-start his career. We now have to make a choice between staying in the district or joining this program. I wish we could do both.
- Communication is an area we could work on.
- Communications seem to be very last minute and leave out details or where to find more info. For example why can't the calendar list what time the late starts are or finals schedules?
- As long as DePere is one of the only cities in the nation with two separate school districts with two administrations, it is hard to agree that money is well spent or the schools are well managed.
- $\ \ \, \ \ \,$  We see more social media posts from the PTO than we do the school or district.
- Need new athletic director- need to move ahead with teachers that are coaches.

## Are there other areas you believe we should focus our planning and resources? If so, what are they? (n=269)

- Equal quality sports venues... the football field and basketball courts are top of the line and then there are other sports such as softball that has no bathroom and has to share a port a potty with tennis and soccer fields. Not ideal for players or fans when they have to walk so far to access a bathroom. Also the softball field are in a ditch so are under water or too wet for most of the season.
- Keeping up with other area schools facility-wise
- At-risk students, identifying struggling students and mentorship for them
- Focus on staff turnover
- I think it would be great to have an alternative high school for students who need it.
- Creating an equitable relationship between athletics, arts, and clubs. I see too many students who have to choose between these activities, and it is not fair. All students should have the opportunity to participate in a variety of extra-curricular activities, and not be ostracized for it.

- I'd also recommend a compensation scale that will keep the high-quality educators in the district. Pay needs/benefits need to be competitive of those districts in the area. Course offerings for bilingual education and/or earlier language education should be offered in elementary schools. Other districts in the area offer/require Spanish and other language courses to elementary students. The district is becoming more diverse, so there needs to be more education about diversity and empathy for other views and cultures.
- I will make my comments go in order of the issues I selected. As far as bilingual services go, we have had a pretty heavy influx of students from Nicaragua at some schools and it has caused a need for more services with limited resources and limited training. These students, because of their political asylum status, are legal residents and will be staying, if not in our community, in our greater community and our population continues to change, yet our types of services and learning around these areas hasn't increased. As far as recruiting and retaining teachers, there has been a definite attitude of ignoring what other districts are doing for compensation because there is a feel that staff will just "desire to be here so much". While there is some truth to that, there are breaking points to everything. The high demands of the Pandemic and Post-Pandemic needs of children (both emotionally and academically), the strain inflation has put on stretching salaries that don't have much potential to grow, and an aging staff are things that need to be looked at moving forward to ensure that we retain the staff we have and can recruit new staff. Currently, those at the top of the payscale get a \$275 raise if there is no exception given. That doesn't even begin to compete with inflation. That's a .4% raise on a salary of \$70,000 for example. There are also limited safety nets if someone were to fall ill in our current benefit package. I also checked off students with difficulties learning because I think that we can always do better to help children and always learn more. I also think it makes sense to look at areas of servicing based on data and what area students tend to struggle with the most. One big concern that has been a concern no matter where I've been is that there is nothing special about special education and it is not the teachers' fault. Special education teachers tend to get the least amount of PD and have the most challenging caseloads. There are a few special education teachers that have had the opportunity for additional training, but it would be amazing if more teachers could have that. I do think that there are plenty of devices for students, but classroom libraries, especially at the elementary level, could use some love.
- There are many athletic venues that do not have running water (bathrooms). With a high quality program that we have, I feel that we should have running water at all facilities regarding to athletics.
- Make sure to help those students who do not qualify for Special Ed, but don't qualify for the math intervention either. These gray area kids are slipping through the cracks and need support, especially if they come from outside of the district where the math foundation is not as strong. All three of my kids are struggling with math at the middle and high school levels, and there is not a lot of support or communication with me about that.
- **I**G Higher level learners, differentiation, gifted and talented

- The HS definitely needs more counselors in place. There are the same amount (4) that the HS had when they had half the amount of students. Career counseling is lacking due to their caseloads and I'm sure they could do more with supporting mental health if they weren't so bogged down with numbers.
- I would love to also click Bilingual services, but thought that supporting diversity was more broad. Simple things such as inclusive school posters, banners, but also more staff applicable training in restorative classroom discipline and equity is truly needed. Some students are completely out of control and often no admin support is provided. If they do come, little is done to rectify and prevent the situation in the future.
- Are there any plans for additional staff trainings for emotional well-being? We focus a lot of time and energy on the students we teach, are there any mental health or wellness programs for teachers? Maybe staff development day could be used for that?
- See other section.
- Not all buildings are welcoming.
- High school needs more diversity in the language arts area for seniors who not college bound. Seniors are required to take two 0.5 credit language art classes but the choices are not interesting. The district has a lot of students who have been diagnosed with dyslexia/dysgraphia/dyscalculia. We need to have staff trained for those who have been diagnosed and make sure they are getting the correct help. After school tutoring is hard for a lot of families as well as kids are tired and struggle to focus after a long day at school. We need to have students tested by the district for these learning disabilities before 3rd grade if they are struggling with reading, writing, and math. Many of these students are put into interventions but it doesn't help them in the long run because they are not getting the correct help. Students at Foxview are required to take general music and a music choice of choir, orchestra or band. This should be limited to just one music choice. This is an issue for students who are in special education who get pulled for interventions during workshop time. Those students don't get an opportunity to do school work and then have it as homework. This is hard for families who have after school activities or who don't have limited access to technology.
- Focus on Teachers receiving Professional Development from state or national sources vs. retired principals. Train the trainer isn't working.
- Currently, most of our CTE courses are taught in very outdated and small spaces. Currently, class sizes are very large and are forced into unsafe small spaces to teach the courses. Teachers have had cuts to budgets that have hindered their ability to effectively deliver their lessons. The CTE courses continue to grow and show that their is a huge need in our district.
- I would like to see dress uniforms because it's a unifying element and it would change the lack luster attitude in the school. I would like guidelines and follow through for disciplining . I would like to see a NO PHONE policy. It's a big problem

- Ibelieve that creating community/business partnerships can help students see the opportunities in Brown County and possibly help retain/return local students to work here in the future. Students with learning difficulties are often "passed" on to the next grade instead of focusing on more early intervention including transitioning to Special Ed.
- The district does not put enough resources/money/staffing into supervision (before/after school, playground, lunch) and does not provide enough teacher aide help for students who have behavioral or academic needs. We need to look at employing full-time aides, who can help with supervision before and after school (teaching staff should not be doing this) and then are available all day to support students. By offering full-day employment for these teacher aides/supervisors, we will also be attracting the best candidates to work in our schools. We are sorely lacking in both supervision staff and teacher aides at the elementary schools. This contributes to more negative student behaviors and a loss of learning time.
- Ididn't choose Math or Literacy achievement because I feel that USDD does a good job of continuously prioritizing both. I'd like to expand on my choice of "services for students who have difficulties learning". I think it would be optimal for more funds to be allocated for increased intructional assistance for those kids who have difficulties in Math and Literacy, especially in grades K-1. There is such a wide variety of reasons why they are having difficulties in those early grades . . . developmental readiness, lack of experience prior to Kindergarten, young/lack of stamina for the academic work, etc. Some of those kids just need more time and repetition and the classroom teachers' plates are already so full. I believe an Instructional Aide for Kindergarten and 1st Grade in each of the elementary buildings would really benefit the kids who have difficulties learning.

- We know math is one of the hardest requirements at the HS level. Offer math intervention alternatives courses. Offer science intervention courses that will be useful. Unless you are going for a future job related to science in math most of your students don't need to go through the struggle of those classes. Let them have courses that will be of value to their future experiences. Why are we having them required to pass Advanced Algebra when most will not use that in their future jobs? Why not require a useful life skill like financial math (checkbooks, budgeting, bank statements, investments...) or better Health Education as a science alternative to learn about eating healthy and learning the damage that drugs have on your body. When students are choosing courses they should be given a summary of what the course will require. The electives courses currently have no limit on points and that needs to be reevaluated. Some of the electives have a crazy amount of work. I have seen an elective class have the same or more work than a biology/math class. My child had an elective with 4 projects then the next elective class had 26 projects! One elective ended up being about 435 points the other elective ended up having 800+ points in the next semester. Students need to be better informed before signing up. They need to know how many projects they will have and they should know the point value of each elective class so that they can balance their semester workload better. Parents use to be able to see the point values, but now that has been taken off the portal. Right now they sign-up for electives and courses and hope for the best. That is not being transparent! The reason this is important at the HS level more than ever is because grades impact where you go for college, and grades impact sports participation, grades can cause depression. Let your students know what they are signing up for each semester. All it would take is extra information to help students be better informed about the course they are about to take. It doesn't matter maybe to the AP student but it matters to the other 90% of your HS student body. No wonder kids check-out and give up and a majority walk away feeling hopeless about their skills and their future.
- Classrooms need to have more support to help with behaviors, emotions and students with IEPs. Loading a classroom with 4 students that have very different needs in their IEP's and then providing only 1 other teacher or aide to add support at small increments throughout the day is not enough. Students have various needs and that 1 person cannot assist all those students at once while the classroom teacher is trying to maintain the focus of the other students and engage all the learners at their levels. Then you add on the academics, social, emotional and behavioral needs of the other non IEP students and it is too much. This concerns and behaviors take away from the other students. This also causes teacher burn out.
- Social/Emotional/Behavioral support for students through a more educated staff and resources (including increased staffing). Having students who are more in control in SEL areas will benefit ALL students in the classroom and therefore help academics for all as well.

- definitely student discipline and emotional/mental health of students. Equally important is to retain high quality staff

- Teaching students at each grade level, skills to help them support healthy life style through good choices and behaviors
- Discipline is a problem. We have had more vandalism the past few years, but we don't hold students accountable if they are not in class or in class on time. Why? More kids in the halls, or lack of discipline leads to behavioral challenges. The girl's bathroom often have 2-3 girls in the handicap stall and no consequences for being gone from class. They know that we can't mark them absent until 10 minutes and they walk in just before the time limit. A lot can happen in 10 minutes.
- Student Discipline--Stricter Cell Phone policy from the top down.
- A phone policy for the students which would tie into student discipline.
- Career and technical education is misleading. This area includes anything Engineering related. Northeast Wisconsin has a huge manufacturing sector that is in need of engineers, accountants, human resources, trades etc. Well beyond the traditional "shop" classes. A significant number of professional roles require knowledge of technology as most jobs of the past are becoming more automated. This requires people with a broad range of skill sets that often are not learned in the traditional classroom. If students are to be prepared for possible careers, they must see those careers. We need to give students opportunities to see more facilities, job shadow etc. A part of this is providing them with a facility that people can take pride in as opposed to the historical run-down part of the building.
- We do a good job with children who struggle at the elementary level, but fail beyond that point. We do a great job with the kids who qualify for special education but kids who don't are left in a grey area. We have gotten better in the last few years with more tech offerings giving non college bound students more opportunities.
- Academically the district needs to continue to always meet the needs of all students. As a parent of a gifted student - the "gifted" program for K-8 failed him. He did not fit the mold of an easy gifted kid. He saw being smart as a punishment. He was pulled to do projects and then still had to complete the work he missed in class so to him being smart meant double the work. In turn I believe it harmed his focus, drive, and self worth. Thankfully high school he was able to do all classes, but by that time he was in the habit of not trying or caring. The district as a whole does a terrible job with study skills and holding kid's accountable (this is the view of a parent). My other child struggled as a learner - smart kid, but has zero study skills which is following him into college and he is struggling with that now - but was raised in a culture where he was not accountable for homework or even trying. Neither child really knows how to study, even though as parents we held them accountable and worked with them. We sought outside services and programs, but when there is no real accountability (solid deadlines, homework is part of grade, etc.) it is a losing battle - especially if a child struggles either academically or emotionally.

- I would check so many more than just four boxes here. Our staff is burned out and without quality teachers, you won't have quality courses. Our special education staff (at least in the high school) is spread too thin between managing their caseloads and team teaching. We only have four counselors for 1500 students in the high school! How are they supposed to actually counsel our students with mental health issues, when they are busy with scheduling and college prep duties? Our students think that they have to get a bachelor's degree to be successful. Our CTE facilities are outdated and not effective for today's students.
- As stated earlier, we need more time to simply feel like we are not barely keeping our head above water. Rested teachers result in happier teachers resulting in an overall better work environment for all.
- I feel like we are SEVERELY behind when it comes to understanding and supporting diversity in our student body. In my opinion, we are about 5-10 years behind in trends that other schools are doing. The last district I was at in this area offered meaningful PD led by diverse community members to address bias that we have. As a predominately white staff we need to do a lot better. I also think we are years behind when it comes to working with our Queer students. As an educator in this district who identifies as part of the Queer community I see some major issues in policies we have and supports we offer to our students. I would like to see us not only acknowledge the diversity that exists in our student body, but actively and financially support teaching efforts to address academic and behavioral gaps in our student body.
- The schools need to better keep up with technology in the classroom. The softball facilities are well below other facilities in our district.
- With student needs being so great since the COVID-19 pandemic, a focus on recruiting and retaining student services staff (e.g., school nurses, school psychologists, school social workers) should be a must.
- Career and technical education (shop) program is more than just shop. They also have Business, Agriculture, FCE, engineering, high tech equipment for students to learn and program that so many careers are needed for. Students seem to not have as much 'hands and head" combination opportunities at home and school as before. With these 'shop' classes, we are giving them the needed learning that so many people need to have to be successful and contributing members of our society. All students need to have some street smartness, not just book smartness. When planning, think about the great opportunities that our local economy has to offer our future. Thank you for putting CTE in as a choice for our planning effort.
- Offer Spanish beginning at the elementary level and an automotive repair career path. Financial life skills should be a mandatory course because not every child has a parent who can teach them about checking accounts, credit cards, credit scores, car insurance, home insurance, how to apply for a loan, how to save for the future, etc. Higher standards of respectful language and behavior, all the way through high school. These standards of respect seem to cease at the high school where anything goes when it comes to what students wear and how they speak.

Cyber Security Also, understanding of and support for diversity. Additional resources and teaching staff for special education students Teach students how to think rationally. Teach them how to critically analyze things so they can tell the difference between reality and fiction. Ithink elementary students should get a STEAM specials class with a teacher that is the teacher for that class. Interested to know if De Pere will be adding additional schools for either elementary or middle schoolers. The high school bathrooms need to be a safe place to go without students crying in the stalls or using illegal products. Also the policies of the teachers towards bathroom access needs to be reviewed. Choir, band and the arts need more resources...more teachers or teachers' assistants No The Athletics facilities are behind the times and look silly compared to neighbors such as West De Pere, Wrightstown, Kaukauna, Little Chute, Kimberly, etc. Increasing opportunities for additional ways to learn starting in Elementary School - additional languages, fine arts, reading, etc. Absolutely shouldn't be spending time on replacing him/her with they/their! Hell, now none of the policies apply to my kids! LOL trying calling one of them they/their please! Call me that and witness the feedback... Financial planning education type course for life after high school should be mandatory Please keep politics out of your future planning and stay focused on quality education. We have a dyslexic son and we truly believe there needs to be additional help for dyslexic learners, and the help needs to be specific to them. So many people learn to read and spell differently and the teachers need the training to identify them and help them accordingly. Right now I feel it is a "one size fits all" approach and after seeing him get the right help at an offsite dyslexia clinic we can see the difference, unfortunately the need outpaces the available resources in our area so many students are just not getting the extra/correct help.

- UWGB offers a program, Rising Phoenix, that allows high school students of participating districts who meet certain criteria to earn an Associate's degree by the time they graduate from high school. I would strongly encourage De Pere to join this program, so our kids have access to this career accelerating and economically extremely attractive program
- My biggest gripe is the school district is doing absolutely nothing for students with Dyslexia. Do you know how many students suffer from Dyslexia??? We have to go to a clinic in town to get my daughter help. This clinic has a waiting list of over 100 students. Why don't you use some of your resources you have and provide help for students in need.
- More neurodivergent support, more inclusive language, the after school activities were great (Diversity Club, Cribbage, etc.) however the spaces were so limited, would really love to see opportunities like that, not just intramurals, and for the intramurals to be more structured (i.e. my son didn't show up, he was confused and went straight to the YMCA after care a few times and I had no idea no one from intramurals was looking for him, kids tackling in flag football, etc.)
- It seems like most of the funds go toward football and the sports. These are great things for those that enjoy them. However, the division of funds seems heavily unbalanced in favor of sports.
- Facility improvement
- I would like to see announcements communicated verbally to students. I have two students at the high school that don't go in a read the announcements. The same is true of their friends and they are missing out on activities etc. their own fault but if kids aren't reading it then maybe spending a few minutes in flex each day wound be helpful.
- Provide busing for students that live 1+ miles from their respected school. Expecting elementary and intermediate children to walk up to 2 miles to school is not a safe option. This can be set by the school district. This rule is outdated and needs to be reviewed. Children should not be walking in the dark and crossing certain roads and roundabouts. Not every parent is able to be a stay at home parent and may not be able to drive their child to school in the morning.

- Redesign the high school Parking lot it's terrible and unsafe. Spots need to be angled and slightly larger (yes, you will lose some spots. Making them smaller to fit more cars is NOT the solution!) add a roundabout and EXIT onto chicago street that goes to the front of the school. Actually the lot could use two more additional exits! Add another parking lot behind school / and/or work with neighboring business to create a satellite parking lot for newest drivers. - Allow high school students more time between classes so they can use their lockers or let them carry backpacks. - better monitor the leadership in NHS and too many requirements to track. - monitor the coaches better. Many are pushing students to MISS class for ridiculous games. Not fair to the students or teachers because coaches can't plan. Also, coaches push students too much to RUSH to practice instead of focusing on getting there safely. Monitor when practice times start and make sure they are reasonable. Kids already rush all day because there is no time to get to their lockers. Follow the students for a week and see what they deal with. Give more space for LUNCH! It's their one break and they have to rush to get a seat. Again, kids need a mental break from all the hustle all day long. - Bring in after school optional ACT training class. - Make it easier to change scheduled classes. - Explain all math path options when the kids are in 8th grande and again as freshman. It's very confusing. - Stop requiring students to take chemistry before they can take AP Chemistry (same for Biology)
- Recruit dministrators willing to work with families.
- 1. Athletics I think the district can do a better job of raising all athletics, not just a select few. And Athletics should be supportive of all extra curriculars, and other athletics. The athletic facilities (outside of the gymnasium) need to be improved to provide the first class facilities to those who participate in extra curriculars. 2. I'd like to see more partnerships with local businesses that can utilize tech ed and shop programs. Colleges and universities are not for everyone, I feel as though DP is drastically falling behind in the tech ed/shop department. 3. Communications with parents/community - this was never more apparent than it was during Covid. With recent changes on the school board, I had hoped it would get better, but it simply hasn't. Communication is lacking from the leadership in the district to the community. I'd like to see more opportunities to understand the direction the district is going and why. 4. Fine arts - Fine arts have taken a back seat to all things athletics. The Athletic department and booster clubs act only in their own best interests and not the best interests of the district. The recent change to specific electives was pushed through the high school at the 11th hour, and could have major implications on other fine arts based electives. This seems to be "the De Pere way" to push things through last minute, rather than involving all parties and coming to a conclusion that works best for everyone. Fine arts and Athletics can and should be able to co-exist and thrive within the DP district. There are many districts where both are strengths. It will take work and sacrifices from both

- Finding a way to make schools safe and secure so that students also FEEL safe, trusted, and secure. Active shooter drills teach children that they are not safe in school and will have to rely on themselves for protection; this is causing a mental health crisis. The drug testing of students also teaches them that their school does not trust them so is checking up on them. I think there needs to be a focus on building a culture of mutual trust and care that starts with doing some work on best practices for teaching empathy, community and wellness.
- The district could make it easier for parents to access the lesson plans and student books and assignments instead of placing all tge responsibility on the kids (especially grades 10 and under). It also would be nice if parents could elect to hold their children back a grade. We know our children and their struggles best and while the school can gift reasons and recommendations and prevent repeated hold backs, it's not good if our children wind up struggling for all the remainder of their years as a result, like my son currently is, because foundational skills were not mastered at a more appropriate time.
- Sustainability and the outdoors. I'd love that when my son starts kindergarten there's an emphasis on nature, taking care of the early, outdoor learning and classrooms, and a school garden.
- Hire principals that are actually engaged in the schools and don't hate their jobs
- I think Phy Ed should not be required. I think classes about basic life skills are more important. Things like Banking, Loans, Insurance, Computer Skills, Civics/Government Knowledge, Finance and Investments
- Prepare the district for true diversity...
- Math and sciences. Also information technology.
- Parking, drop off/ pick up procedures, complete athletic fields, indoor facility, weight room
- Less online homework Buses that are useful.
- College prep happens too late. Ideally, we would have an opportunity to meet with school counselors as students start high school to ensure their course selection and track map to their plans after graduation. My understanding is that the HS counselors don't have enough time to do so, which indicates the district is understaffed in that area.
- We used to live in another district that offered a course that covered life 101. How to file taxes, balance checkbook, understand investing, understand how savings and checking works, setting a budget. These are all items that students need to have to be successful in life. Especially when they are heading off to college which potentially will be one of the most expensive things they do in life.

- We need better baseball fields to compete against west of here or other teams in our conference. The baseball fields are horrible! There needs to be crossing guards by the high school as people do not stop or slow down for kids in crosswalks. I'm shocked there hasn't been a casualty yet they're
- Help when students fall behind with learning instead of pushing them thru the system
- I think the main focus should be preparing and educating our children for life.......I believe quality teachers are essential but I think like in every employment situation we need to make teachers accountable and those who do not muster need to be let go. I know this is difficult when facing shortages of staff. Then there has to be incentives for them to do there job. Money alone does not make better employees.
- Free lunches for all students during the school year.
- Being able to support individual students where they are is important. We seem to have to take a broad stroke, and some children are being lost in the process.
- We need to focus on fundamentals.....the education system has strayed form this. Our children our not learning the skills they need to be successful adults and leaders.
- More emphasis on real world jobs...examples like automotive repair, Building construction, wood working, metals, etc.
- Student transportation is a major disappointment for the more remote students. This year kids from the Ledgeview area are on the bus for nearly an hour and a half each way. For working families that don't have flexibility for pickup /dropoff this is a hardship for the students. We are expecting young students to be up and ready before most adults are and expecting them to succeed in their learning. As we grow as a community the likelihood of this transportation time extending further is a real concern.
- Understanding and supporting diversity.
- BUSSING!! My elementary schooler is on the bus for an hour and a half every morning and an hour and twenty minutes every afternoon.... something has to give :-(
- The abolishment of the tax levy on properties Putting the responsibility of children on the parents instead of property owners Quit parenting that's the parents job Quit insulting and oppressing property owners without children Don't ever refer the children as our children they belong to the parents not me Explore every other financial revenue source be before stealing from me so others can live a better lifestyle
- Better athletic facilities

**I** believe we can learn from what schools failed to do for our generation (Millennials): We should make sure we are preparing students for the world as it WILL BE when they are adults, not preparing them for how the world is now. Their life will be one of constant change and global challenges. Let's accurately prepare them for that world. ~ Focus on keeping the "inner city" riff raff out of our schools. The district needs to make school board meetings more accessible to parents. Virtual attendance options, live streaming, and the ability to watch a recorded meeting the morning after are very basic technology upgrades that will allow parents to stay updated on decisions made by the board. Students need to have climate change education and knowledge on how to live sustainably. Making more secure campuses Science and Technology Training; Advanced Robotics; STEM Last year, a student was shot with a pellet rifle while on the tennis court during a summer practice by a member of the football team. That meant he brought a weapon onto school campus. This should never happen, and should not be swept under the rug. Parents should not have to hear about this through the gossip grapevine. Civics and accurate history education. Do a better job celebrating all achievements. Not just basketball/football Suggest a more deliberate approach to funding of events and activities that are nontraditional but are academically merit based. Sports and clubs with the highest average GPAs or largest active participation receiving enhanced funding. Sports and clubs incentivized to help student improve grades or study habits. Reward teachers, coaches and mentors who lead, excel, improve and enrich the student groups they work with. The school does a much better job at offering college credit classes then it did the last 10 years. Science and understanding its roll in human knowledge as well as a focus on Climate Change and its impact. more diversity of students I think you should work on developing a culture of accountability with your staff.

Teachers (adults) should be held to higher standards than the students (kids). That is currently not the case. This will help improve the overall respect for

teachers.

Mandatory financial courses for real life applications that affect every part of their adult lives. More interventions to help ALL kids succeed. l feel the lack of technology is the greatest area for improvement for the school district. Keeping current with technology, and providing our students with the opportunity to interact with the community and local businesses. Tough to choose as there are so many valid choices in this section. I wish I could have rank ordered all of them or at least as many as I wanted to. Having 4K in the elementary schools instead of local daycares. Renewable energy Behavioral support and integration for neurodivergent and autistic students. Student body education on making and maintaining friendships with neurodivergent and autistic students. Bully prevention school wide. We are years behind in technology and athletic facilities, especially for sports other than football and basketball. Football program - bring it up to par with other high quality school districts in the area (Kimberly, Bayport) Focus on educating our next generation on being productive responsible members of our society for all to achieve success to the best of their abilities, which may be different from one person to another. Athletic department should focus on ALL sports. Not just boys basketball and football. Celebrate achievements of all athletes. However, focus should be on STUDENt first...athlete second. I feel like some messages from the athletic department have encouraged otherwise. Math & literacy achievement, fine arts & services for students that have difficulty learning but this could also be better achieved if the distractions in the classroom could be better contained. Our district is unique in that we don't offer foreign language district-wide until middle school. Hard to imagine that the district is truly fulfilling their mission to, "prepare all learners to be successful and contributing members in our global society" when the only language emphasized through the first 9 years of each students journey in education is English. The athletic program does a good job of staying mostly competitive. However, the

weight room is well below average (boys and girls) and there is a need for year

round access to an indoor training/practice facility.

- With talk of changing the schedule, I'm hoping there is emphasis on still maintaining the extra hour before the schedule starts so that the kids that take rigorous classes and music can get in all the classes that they want.
- Building improvements for the older schools!
- Our facilities need to be upgraded and more space needs to be provided at several schools. The quality of the education we can provide is being negatively impacted due to space constraints, availability of technology & equipment and overall resources for extensions of learning, like field trips and building community relations.
- student discipline-being more equitable. Hiring and retaining a more diverse staff.
- Again, after covid and other social issues, there are more mental health/emotional issues with kids (and adults) than ever before.
- A financial/life skills class for upperclassmen in high school, but making it a mandatory part of graduation. Covering the topics of student loans and interest payments, career planning, compound interest, saving, investing, how to find insurance, explanation of FUTA/SUTA taxes, how to fill out a w-2 and understand what it actually means, credit scores and credit cards, basic economic skills that our students need to understand as they leave school and enter in adulthood. Not all households take the time to teach these life skills to their kids, and we need to teach our youth to be successful and financially/personally responsible.
- Focus on teaching and set a zero tolerance for misconduct. Too much fear on both ends of the spectrum: upsetting residents with money (old superindendent), Woke and bitchy deadbeats. Rules are rules and if not followed send them somewhere else. The majority will stand with you. Society is falling apart because there isn't anyone with the balls to stand up.
- This is not an additional area, but I'd like to comment on an area I checked from above. One of the questions on all UW schools applications is did you have any college credits? My son would have taken college courses, but there were none/few available. My niece attended West De Pere high school and graduated with so many college credits. It made her application for college so much stronger.
- We need EBD programs. It shouldn't be an option to send a student somewhere else because they "can't be successful here". We need to provide the opportunities and resources for them to be successful. Public school is for everyone. Even in De Pere.
- Building maintenance and safety over new football bleachers should have been a priority. If the high school floods when it rains more than 3 inches, we don't need new football bleachers, we need to make sure the students and teachers aren't being affected by mold and toxic chemicals used to band aid the problem.

- I think if you focus on hiring/retaining high quality staff, keep our schools safe, incorporate proper technology in a tech-heavy world, and emphasize life skills necessary for adulthood, all of the other areas of focus really roll up under these pillars.
- The school is currently a sensory nightmare. Efforts to reduce overcrowding, provide appropriate spaces to learn (i.e. students shouldn't have to take exams in the weight room) and to make the students more comfortable would be appreciated (i.e. provide chairs that are not painful to sit in). The recent policy to only use a student's legal name is also causing mental health issues with some students. If a student wants to go by a different name (with parent approval) they should be able to do so. It would be a relatively minor change that would be very impactful for some students already going through emotional turmoil.
- It has been brought to my attention that De Pere puts more focus on college and not much towards "hands on jobs". We need plumbers, construction, mechanics, lineman. Not sure if you've seen the pay associated with some of these... They are much more than I make with a 2 year and a 4 year degree. Not all kids are cut out to go to college. Maybe expand the horizon of the tech Ed program
- Limiting to four choices was difficult, the district should be focused on retaking and recruiting qualified staff. Our schools lack diversity. The district should actively make efforts to employ teachers from diverse backgrounds. The district should also focus on topics of anti-racism.
- There is too much emphasis especially in the younger grades put on getting along. While yes, we all need to get along and respect one another, we as adults are not forced to interact with those we do not want to so why are we forcing children to develop a friendship with someone their personality does not jive with?
- Keeping high quality staff, encourage staff to live within the district..
- more mental health supports are needed. From what I observe counselors spend more time dealing with mental health needs than they do with actual school counseling for academics and career planning.
- ROTC program
- Bullying at the schools. The bullies are not held accountable, and it is brushed under the rug. Students do not feel she talking to staff abut these situations because nothing is confidential.
- More courses in agriculture, horticulture, agronomy/crop and soil science, plant life, etc. Teach the kids about sustainability and what it takes to continue to feed the world. A world without farmers is a hungry one. Explore opportunites on classes not offered by USDD in a virtual aspect with NWTC so kids without vehicles/transportation can still be offered the same opportunities as others.

- I am concerned with the growth in new neighborhoods and homes being built & overcrowding in our schools. I feel like the high school is nearing max capacity for ideal class sizes & similarly the younger grades seem to be getting larger every year in our elementary schools.
- I wanted to select athletics above as well, but for different reasons than most. It really stinks athletically to live in a division 1 school district. Most of my 6 kids love sports but will have almost no chance to ever play sports or enjoy sports competitively because they aren't "good enough" or we can't afford the extra lessons, clubs, and leagues that other families can. At the youngest grade levels all the way through high school I'd like to see an emphasis on offering athletics for kids who aren't competitive with division 1 athletes. Also, get cell phone out of our schools. This is a HUGE issue in almost every school, and even where rules say "no phones" they aren't enforced. Kids don't need phones during the school day. Ever. There are many kids addicted and it creates social issues widespread when these cell phones aren't controlled. Parents can only do so much to prevent use during the school day, and it is widely out of control.
- Using community/business partnerships as an avenue for funding... naming rights, etc.
- facilities updates new auditorium branding consistency public assistance
- Diversity and retention in staff.
- Start students with a foreign language at an earlier age.
- At risk students ARE STRUGGLING and there are more and more of them.
- Based on my childrens' feedback, that I do take with a grain of salt, is that some of the disruptive kids can be such a distraction or even ignored by the teacher to where it affects my children's learning or even their interpretation of what's acceptable.
- Increase education for staff and leadership re: autism spectrum disorder. Staff development in how to best support in academic and social environments. Autism is not a one size fits all, and there is stigma still attached to the label amongst staff (ie: if you walked into the classroom you wouldn't know "they" have autism) Create safe spaces for students to have lunch who are overwhelmed with the sounds and smells in typical lunchrooms. Additional support staff who work with students on the spectrum, and involving experts in IEP's or 504 meetings who have experiences with learners on the spectrum.
- Have the technology for students to use on-line platforms on school owned devices so they don't need to use their phones for school work. They are too easily distracted if they have their personal device.
- More offerings for gifted and talented students, especially in grades 5 8. There is one teacher for all grade schools, and Foxview.

- We need to do more to help students realize there are high-paying opportunities in the trades and support non-college-bound students more. Another need is a new larger weight room; ours is way too small, especially when classes such as speed and strength are going on. Lastly, we also need an indoor sports facility like Kimberly and West De Pere.
- Environmental Education
- I'm disappointed in the lack of diversity in district staff and leadership. I also feel that there is great need to examine the district's adherence to Wisconsin Act 31 and staff training in culturally relevant pedagogy.
- Not enough mental health support, especially in high school. Wait time to talk to a school psychologist is too long.
- Besides the four I selected above, I do believe that athletics are important. In order to stay a desired school district we must first focus on student learning and providing quality instruction. In addition to that we must also realize the importance of a strong athletic department/facilities.
- Creating a more positive building culture/community among teachers listening to teachers, getting their voices heard and understood... Part of that requires admin and coaches to be approachable and open to hearing and trying new ideas.
- Need more gyms for basketball for youth
- I was shocked to find out that there are no second language offerings at the elementary level. Being a graduate with a degree in Spanish, I wrongly assumed that by the time I had school-aged children all schools would be offering a second language when the children are most sponge-like. This greatly bothers me as I feel that we are doing a disservice to our students by not focusing on language in the primary years. Furthermore, literacy is a learned process, and the district really should embrace a multisensory structural approach. Lastly, in order to provide such education, we need to recruit and retain that high quality staff. This includes all staff, not just teaching staff. We need active recruitment and competitive wages. Even before the standards of living rose so quickly, we were at the bottom of the market for employment competition. Our community is trusting that we have high standards and are meeting these standards. We have very loyal staff who deserve to be at least receiving fair market wages.

- Not sure if this is the place to add this- but Youth girls basketball needs to be addressed- the coaches of the 4th grade girls this year picked their favorites to participate on tournament teams. The boys program assigns A, B, C teams from the beginning of the season and those teams participate or choose not to participate in tournament play as a whole team. The girl coaches took their pick of girls from each team. This really made some of those girls feel like they aren't part of the team and given the same opportunities as the other girls who got "picked." Communication from those coaches was minimal in regards to tournament selection. The district needs to strongly consider only allowing non-parent coaches with these sports teams. I understand that can be difficult and there are some parents that really do a great job coaching, but the amount of favoritism and playing time towards their children, friends, or special acquaintances is clearly evident. I believe other local schools (notre dame) follows this process with no parents as coaches. It could really help strengthen your programs by bringing in fresh eyes and fair coaching. Some girls on the teams are strong players but have bad team attitudes and un-coachable but yet they are put on a pedestal because of their athletic skill. When you're on a team, your skill is less meaningful than your ability to be coachable, work cooperatively with your team, and being positive towards your other team mates.
- More areas/events/sponsorships/etc., almost like a business, for being part of things in the community to keep the district in the minds of the community members. To help showcase that a strong school district is beneficial for everyone in a community for economic growth and a positive life, even for those that don't have children going to school.
- More options for kids to be off technologies /phones/social media. More time with other peers outside of school or in the school .More way to keep kids socialized.
- Financial literacy to include budgeting/money management, virtual course offerings should include opportunities for college credit or for students who learn best through remote opportunities. Would love to see more interaction of students with older populations.
- Better counseling for all students. Better communication to the students on what services are offered through the counseling department.
- Include black history, asian history, native american history, hispanic history, etc. we need more cultural understanding and acceptance e in this community.
- The understanding and support for diversity piece is very important for students in a district that is primarily white, middle class to learn about. Understanding the use of microaggressions and how to be more tolerant and empathetic will be an important life skill for all students to know.
- New athletic facilities. We are quickly falling behind all of our surrounding schools. Don't just cater to football and basketball. Other sports have had much greater success, especially compared to football, yet we change our strength and conditioning to one of our least successful programs.

Our schools lack diversity and struggle with teaching our students about race, equity, and helpful responses to incidents that are unacceptable. All our teachers and staff should be participating in training, not those who are simply engaged and already doing the work. We have an opportunity to grow our district in diversity by welcoming refugee families being resettled here by Catholic Charities and those being recruited for employment opportunities. It would dramatically change our district and have lifelong impacts on our students and community.
- I feel like we don't put enough time and money into athletics as other schools in the area. I think there could be tons of improvements to many school building especially Foxview and I am worried about still have open enrollment in the district with the crowding.
- Educate students on diversity and inclusion
- Kids coming out of school have never been taught basic skills needed for life... signing there name because they are not taught cursive....this is needed for checks/documents throughout life. They should be taught the basics on doing taxes.. finances... just to make a few
- Supporting diversity in all aspects would be appreciated. We are not from Wisconsin and it is obvious we are not welcome in many areas. Teachers staff and students could all benefit from diversity of thought, and influence from others outside their normal social circles. Otherwise it only becomes an echo chamber where you don't let others in because of diversity and lose the opportunity to expand your horizons and empathy for others' position opinion or value.
- I think you need to prepare for a variety of careers including the trades. Most entering the workforce today have poor coping skills. Learning to fail and growth from it should be something discussed at the higher grades
- This may come up later in the survey. I think the district should focus on academics as the main purpose of schooling.
- More education and acceptance of diversity in students is needed. I believe some students learn discriminatory behavior at home and then bring these views to school. Bullying students because of their gender identity should never be accepted and I believe schools need to do more to teach acceptance.
- Integrating technology into coursework
- Improving our sports facilities tennis, softball, baseball & soccer fields. Also add in indoor sports complex like West De Pere. DPHS has fallen behind and will fall even further by not having space for athletes to practice all year.
- Digital wellness and healthy use of social media
- Improved grounds/building at high school including improved athletic field BESIDES the football field.

- More field trips, experiences for the kids

Would love to see resources for the arts department.

- We seem to prioritize test scores above everything else, and I think we forget that students need to be mentally healthy in order to succeed. Therefore, I believe we need a significantly improve and add to our ability to serve those that needs social/emotion/mental services for students. We do not have an adequate number of resources available at this time.
- Opportunity and encouragemnt for lifelong learning and a larger view beyond our community, while valuing our community.
- I have to pick up 3 kids from 3 different schools, it would be really amazing to have a BETTER after school pick up area in between the high school & middle school. There should be enough space for 30 cars for pick up but there isn't enough space. We could get rid of those Boulders or place them in a better location (keep cars off the fields, etc) and re-pave a walkway. I've been doing this for 2 years now & it is incredibly stressful for after school pick up. I cannot get there any earlier because I have 2 schools that let out earlier where I pick up kids. So my arrival time for Middle/High School pick up is 3pm. Would actually love it if the High Schoolers were let out before the rest of the schools, then that would alleviate the crazy drivers & traffic. Because High School is let out last, we have parent drivers and high schooler driving on all the roads near the schools. It is chaotic. And that round about does not ensure flow for anyone who parks in High school lot or the parent pick up b/t middle and high school. It is absolutely nuts.
- Look into Project Lead the Way programs for STEM curriculum.
- I think the 3K learning lab program at the high school is FANTASTIC and it is unfortunate the such a small number of students are able to benefit from it. There is no doubt that students come out of that program very well prepared for 4K and beyond and I would love to see 3K programming expanded to accommodate a larger number of students. I think such an effort would pay dividends throughout students' entire academic careers, allowing students to be identified for special education services even earlier and allowing all students to be more successful overall.

- Just to follow up on my choices...I feel that our community should step up and partner with our schools in area of needs. I also feel that sometimes student discipline isn't dealt with in terms of strong consequences. When students make very poor choices, they should get a hammer of consequences. I don't care if the kid is a 2nd grader or a 12th grader, make them and their family feel it when they act out. If they act like a jackass, they should have some real consequences. Sorry for the language. Math achievement...based on the experiences of my own children, our high school math staff works REALLY hard to help kids in math. They go above and beyond. However, it appears that we are lacking in curriculum options for kids. If you are a kid who is great at math, our math program works well. If you are an average or below average math student, you are in for some real struggles. There seems to be a reluctance for some reason to provide a lower-level math class for kids who really struggle to help build them up to "proficiency." Even though many parents in our district wish for their kid to be a doctor or engineer, most will not. We need to stop pretending that every kid needs that level of math.
- A more up to date atmosphere for learning. Most progressive schools I have seen really make you want to be there just because of the eye popping modern look in all aspects of their facilities. Entrance, social areas, athletics, and other areas in De Pere's current K-12 buildings look good but are in second place to other Green Bay area facilities. I would support upgrades with a 20 year plan in place for continuous improvement in providing the teachers and students, not just a good place to learn, but one that really stands out and provides more opportunity for them.
- These are all what I have selected above but want to explain the importance. I feel the district is very supportive of diversity but should remain focused on the ever changing world we are living in. Also along with that I feel mental health services are a must. High school is a critical time in a child's life when they are finding themselves. Focus should always be on mental health which goes along with that. Not all students are getting support at home, unfortunately.
- College credit courses vs AP courses in the high school are needed and in some instances leaving De Pere students behind. Particularly in the sciences (not trades) and Math. De Pere is behind other area schools in this regard.
- increase staffing for special education along with emotional/social education...elementary bldgs. need more technology needs a boost...feeling a bit outdated at the elementary bldgs. increase and offer bilingual courses and support at the elementary level
- 4k program is a close 4th. Is 3 hours/day 4 days a week enough to prepare for Kindergarten?
- Outside of 1 meeting with a counselor junior year, there isn't any follow up on planning for life after high school. I would like the school to support more through that process. I talked to a student (not my child) recently who said she had not yet applied for college. I know that my kids relied heavily on me as a parent to plan for after graduation and not all students have parents than can or will provide that help.

- In today's competitive educational marketplace, it is critical for USDD to strategize around recruitment and retention of highly qualified staff who push the boundaries of instructional innovation. This District lacks an innovative approach to addressing the needs of diverse learners.
- Having two students who are in the special education program, I think it is critical to focus attention in this area. All children do not learn the same. I think it is highly important to retain quality special education teachers and fund training programs.
- Upgrading and adding facilities to meet the demands of growth.
- Providing teachers with more support and planning time to help with the increased expectations put on them.
- I truly believe there needs to be a course in high school that helps kids after school. teach them about debt (esp college dept), how to do taxes, how to make a resume, ho to apply for a bank loan, money management, how to learn about investing like 401k's, roths. how to follow the stock market. just more well rounded students to prepare for life after high school.
- De Pere needs to expand more in the area of diversity. We need to strive for higher acceptance of all, not just the majority.
- Improved quality of student lunches
- Social/emotional/mental health services. Receiving emails about students lost to suicide is heartbreaking.
- Culture of understanding, inclusion, anti/bullying
- We need to focus on catching students up on the skills and study habits that were compromised while the schools were closed /not in person Especially those that were getting close to high school- over that year, the importance of studying, homework, and completion were portrayed with lesser importance than in the past- with a new standard of leniency which we are now experiencing the after effects during the high school 'permanent record' years.
- increased investment in school nurses, counselors and social workers. Staffing levels should not be the same as pre-covid. Counselors are lacking trauma informed training and time to meet the individual needs of students and support teachers in the classroom,
- Buildings in the district, new buildings to support population growth as well as offering more than two foreign languages.

- in general, the District is doing really well! One thing I think i have seen in other similar high achieving school districts is a really well- developed media literacy/tech literacy learning curriculum offered by school library. Anything the school libraries can do and be supported in for programming to teach kids google, tech, research skills will help them so much. I do wish there were also some of the PLTW engineering courses, though there may be some that i have not seen. Those courses appeal across stem disciplines are typically hands on and very future career minded as our world changes in what prep kids will need.
- I think having engaged and enthusiastic teachers/staff is most important. I believe De Pere district does well and that's why we moved to De Pere. Please continue with that effort. As I mentioned before, I'd love to see more celebration, not just "support and understanding", but actually showing appreciation of diversity as the US population landscape is changing as the whole. Celebration in early years of elementary schools, and then learning more about actual conflicts and how to live in diverse (and divided) societies in high school. Teachers need more training with racial/ethnic bias. Bias happens for all humans including myself, but it is imperative that teachers try to reduce that. I had an incident last fall with my child, who is multi-racial, at an elementary school. He was in a bathroom with many boys from the class, but the teacher (she was a new teacher to school) called on only two students, both the only children of color in the class. I know it's difficult in these situations, but I cannot stop wondering if teachers called on two kids who "stood out" because of the skin color. Again, that's a natural part of human perception; however, I believe it is important for teachers to get bias trainings routinely to reduce that as much as possible. Thank you.
- I do believe that more attention should be put into fine arts as well.

- Civics, please.
- Systemic racism in the HighSchool is indicative of a community problem and needs the leadership of the HighSchool to combat the ignorance and cruelty toward students who are not "white".
- Safety of students and community in all of the parking/drop off & pick up areas. Enforcing of no parking zones (maybe repainting or marking off lanes near Libel extension).
- Recruit/retain high qualified staff. Challenge the students. Don't assume all kids going to college want to go to UW Madison.
- I would like to see second languages offered earlier. I am concerned about the emotional wellbeing of children in the district. The amount of politics involved in athletics is sad to me. The amazing teachers are the reason the district is so wonderful.
- Facility needs and foreign language options
- Expansion plans for the population keep class sizes smaller to encourage more student-teacher interaction. Drug and alcohol education and prevention.
- I would like to see bilingual courses offered to the younger grades. I also think the development of technical programs and skills for students who may not go on to upper education are important to a thriving community. I think continued academic achievement in literacy and math are crucial. To better meet academic needs, I'd like to see more teachers trained in designing lessons with universal design for learning principles in mind. I'd also like to see more of a push for flexible learning spaces. Not every student can be successful in a traditional classroom environment sitting in a desk listening to a classroom lecture. We need flexibly designed lessons, seating, and learning spaces! My 4h grader has a teacher who does an amazing job at this right now. I'd like to see more of this done in the district.

Take students concerns seriously.
- I would love to see intellectual clubs available after school as well as sports. Especially for the kids in intermediate and middle school.

- Again, hire psychologists/social workers to aid "guidance counselors" in supporting family and mental health challenges, which usually are the cause of poor academic performance.
- "A wider range of courses for students" refers to my previous comment regarding foreign language courses for elementary students. Not only do we need to continue to hire top-quality staff, we need to be comfortable parting ways with teachers who do not meet these standards.
- Career and technical education courses involve many more options than 'shop' classes. I believe the shop classes could use some additions/modifications to improve, but feel other careers could also be focused more on related to skills that will help students determine if it is something they would like to do after high school that may involve a different path than college. Such as technology related jobs, etc.



Her ex husband trafficked her and her traffickers got involved in some high tag thefts and she was drugged at the hotel where it all was found. I could tell you story after story. ## Comments/questions/suggestions: (n=179)

- 4K students should be brought onsite to provide them with access to our district's resources (library, bilingual aides, etc.). Our early childhood program could be grouped with these students in an Early Learning Center to provide more inclusive services, as well.
- If it is decided to add on to the high school or build a new high school, create more "community spaces" that could service as classrooms, performance spaces, meeting rooms, or otherwise.
- Just be aware that there were already HUGE tax increases this year in De Pere. My own personal property taxes went up over \$1,500 this year and are now \$7,000...another piece of salaries not being able to keep up with costs.
- Running water at athletic facilities should be added to this.
- We are over crowded at every building.

- We ABSOLUTELY need a new HS (please choose a plan that incorporated natural light into common areas like library, cafeteria and most classrooms). This should have been thought about years ago but wasn't. Now so many of our buildings are in crunch mode. I sure hope the public supports a referendum. Be sure to get pictures of the crowded spaces so they can see that the district isn't just asking to ask but that there is a true need.
- Please include other sports besides boys football and boys basketball in the referendum. Just because they don't generate as much fan support doesn't mean the other sports mean any less to students and spectators.
- WE need This! Our facilities are old and out dated!
- In short: we need more space! Classes are larger and we do not always have classrooms or space for alternate activities.
- What are we waiting for? We need to start the improvements immediately.
- Please build a new high school in town. It can go right where the extra soccer and baseball fields currently reside, between Dickinson and the high school. The taxpayer base pays more in De Pere, and therefore they deserve to retain the high school. Plus, when it's centrally-located, it's easier for lower-income students to access.
- Other areas, such as the agriculture area are very outdated and are lacking appropriate space.
- Educate the community. Invite members of the community into the buildings to show where the needs are and to furthur explain why specific changes are necessary. Also, explain how those changes will directly impact their children.
- Schools being over capacity is a major issue- we need to plan for additional buildings asap
- not for athletics, but for the items listed, yes
- Everything you suggested needs to be done. There also needs to be some space allocated to our tier 1 students. Sensory room, real special ed room and space. As I mentioned before many of the high school science rooms need completely overhauled and upgraded for safety and educational purposes. I would skip cosmetic initially and start with safety and classrooms. If there is money leftover then address flooring and asphalt replacement.
- When there are garbage cans in the hallways after it rains or snow melts to catch the water dripping from the ceiling, there is a major health issue. No one wants to talk about mold but how can there not be any. Please replace Dickinson's roof soon. This is a health hazard as well as a safety issue.
- Is it worth updating, or building new?

- A new foods room to accommodate the growing population of students taking foods courses. Not having to share classrooms and not overlapping foods courses together. Possibly 2 separate foods rooms. More staff restrooms would also be great.
- There are absolutely parts of our building here at the high school that simply are no longer functional. Many areas have seen improvements over the years, but we have major deficits in our Engineering and Technology areas as well as our ability to maintain our school building repairs.
- I always support any school referendums, but I do not live in De Pere.
- I do not live in the district, so it's easier for me to answer in the affirmative to this question. The most important thing to me about the district considering going to referendum is that we are transparent with the price tag of the funds we will need for the areas mentioned above. I would want to ensure community members aren't left in the dark at any step in the process.
- This is long overdue. Let's do it right and set this district up for success for the next 30 years. We should build a new high school and reconfigure some other buildings to set them up for the future. Maybe have a 4k building, alternative-type school, etc. Could the current high school have some work put in to fix it up a bit and turn it into a middle school? Could the current middle school become another intermediate? I'm excited about the potential for all of this!!!
- Wow, I guess we need these Technical Education ('shop') classes. Most of the above workers are probably former 'shop' students. :)
- Athletics needs more space. We have speed and strength sprinting down hallways which is rather unsafe. I should not have to get out of the way when I am trying to do my job. But more importantly, the high school leaks from the roofs, water comes up through the floor during rain storms, lacks storage spaces, and carpet in a lot of rooms need to be replaced.
- I would also like to see updates made to athletic facilities to accommodate for the growing population of athletes.
- Would highly support an elementary school being built closer to Ledgeview, as increasing population and young families would be greatly served and reduce strain on other existing schools.
- While I value public education, moving from another state, I am not overly impressed with what I have observed in De Pere schools. Things are fine largely due to engaged parents with resources supporting their children. Since I choose to send my children to a private school (and pay tuition), I would likely not support a referendum/tax increase.

- I wouldn't count on the Southern Bridge happening, as it has been in the works since the 1960s and traffic patterns have changed after Covid. Also, school attendance may drop off as more home schooling and virtual school options become utilized. Also, there may be lower birthrates for the people living in this attendance area. Just saying there are more needs than the current budget can pay only tells part of the story. You need to be more convincing that the funds being spent elsewhere in the budget are being used in a responsible manner before I can agree the District needs to go to a referendum as the only option.

- I have lived in Howard for the past 20 years, and the community there has supported SEVERAL referendum's since I've been there. The Howard-Suamico school district is not afraid to ask for financial support from the community, and the results of those referendums show in both their up-to-date buildings and growing school enrollment. Families want their children to go there because of all that the district has to offer. They are building a performing arts center...for the middle school...as we speak! Howard-Suamico referendums pass because they have the support of the community. They also pass because the referendums are well-organized and advertised with promotion campaigns that educate the citizens about both the reasoning why the referendum is needed, and the benefits to the citizens as a whole. I'm confident that it would work here in DePere as well.
- Should also consider referendum to include updating athletic space and facilities (ie better and bigger speed and strength facility), especially if we want to be able to continue to compete with schools that have done these updates like West DePere, Bay Port, etc.
- Ledgeview and Depere have seen a very large growth in population in recent years and several new homes and developments constructed. I would need to understand how that added tax flow has affected the overall school budget as this has brought many of the new students to the district which is causing this overcrowding. I agree the buildings need to be maintained and services upgraded before failure, but evaluation of a master plan for some of the buildings needs to be completed before longer term investments are made. Dickenson and Foxview are aging facilities that longer term worth/ function needs to be evaluated prior to big investments. Altmayer is not a very old building at this point in time and should not have needed major building renovations if proper materials were used during construction. What is causing these pre-mature material failures?
- This is way overdue!

- I would only support facility updates that are LEED certified and/or renewable energy/zero carbon solutions. Any infrastructure upgrades would need to be from sustainable materials. - The over capacity issues at the intermediate, middle and high schools are a major concern of mine as a parent. We have two children in 1st and 3rd grade this year and I am concerned about class sizes 5th grade and beyond in anticipation of their transition out of elementary school. We have greatly appreciated the prioritization of small classes at the elementary level. Overcrowding also poses additional issues beyond academic achievement (ie. safety and security).
- 100% willing to pay higher taxes to improve facilities, especially high school and middle school.
- It is essential we keep our schools up to date and safe for our students.
- This is a large list and I don't know what the prioritization would be and associated costs. More information is needed to know the extent and how long and what the affects would be.
- I would want to see more information before committing to supporting the referendum. I lean towards yes.

- This is a terribly leading question. As it relates to survey design, can you really get good data by identifying a laundry list of items that are in need of addressing followed immediately by a question on whether facilities need to be updated. I assume you'll get the responses you desire from this question. With that said, this District needs to have a plan to accommodate growth to be addressed by facilities and I would support nearly any plan to better serve our students. I have yet to see any significant strategic planning for this pending issue which has been on the horizon for years. This Board has been derelict in its duties to strategically plan around this issue. Are the issues listed above the result of a facilities study or based on the perspectives of those who have worked in the District? A strong strategic plan for facilities would have included a systematic evaluation of its facilities. Further, it would appear as though the fiscal plan to accommodate growth has been to go to referendum with little or no forethought. The superintendent has stated this publicly. This is not a failure of the new superintendent but of the Board to have a strategic plan around facilities.
- Facilities need to keep up with current and future growth

A new performing arts space would easily be able to accommodate the 3 school mentioned above and would better allow those resources to be shared.

  Opportunities for students that do NOT participate in sports. What facilities are available for them to use?
- I'd gladly take on a tax to help better my children's resources/environment. As long as I knew the money was being used responsibly.
- A lot of money was recently given to schools with Covid funding. Please make public an accounting of how much was received and how it was used.
- These do seem like a lot of items that should be in a yearly budget for maintenance and upkeep. We know that roofs, ventilation, and paint get old.

  There should be funding built up over time for when these need to be replaced or updated. I do find value in being proud of the buildings that we learn and work in. I'm unsure at this point what would vote for on the referendum.
- You need to explain to the public why the changes are needed. Need to show how building capacity issues will be fixed and convince the public that 5-10 years after changes are made that we are again bursting at the seams or worse we don't need the added space now because population has tales off. Also the district need to have the guts to change school boundaries to alleviate over crowding
- Don't forget at about weather/tornado safety.
- Many of the projects listed above have been a need for quite some time. How are decisions made as to how funds from the annual budget and fundraisers such as the Redbird Rally, are allocated? We don't seem to have an issue upgrading sports facilities and refinishing the gym floor every year; however we don't see any urgency to ensure our buildings are safe and conducive to providing a high quality education. What are the estimated costs and the amount of the referendum to be proposed? Parking at the high school also needs to be addressed.

- We need equitable learning environments that will meet the needs now and in the future. I am deeply concerned about the Technology infastructure. Our teachers need technology and internet that is fast and reliable. Our students deserve touchscreen Chromebooks with displays that are clear and don't cause headaches. As I mentioned previously, we need buildings with flexible learning spaces and seating. Not everyone can learn siting in a desk listening to a lecture/lesson for hours on end. We need classrooms that are designed to meet the needs of all learners. I'd also like to see accessible playgrounds added to the list of projects above.
- The amount of courses at the high school seems adequate and using the 7 AM class period, my kids are able to take advantage of some of the engineering, extra science courses and computer science and still be able to take band and choir courses. I am greatly concerned with recent talk of doing away with this extra period in an effort to shorten our school year. Limiting students ability to take extra courses including STEM courses to end school 4 days earlier will only hurt the quality of our district.
- At a minimum could you have a guard at the high school for crossing Chicago St. When school gets out the 200 walkers INDIVIDUALLY cross the road. This blocks the traffic from the high school parking lot, at the round about. Thus NEW impatient HS drivers end up clogging the parking lot exit while commingling with buses. Very scary the exits of the hs parking lot.... New drivers, busses and pedestrians. It's easy to see...... just watch it.
- An athletics fieldhouse is needed for the district.
- High School students could be bussed to NWTC for learning trades, service industries such as paramedics, dental hygiene, nursing and teaching. This could be presented as a dual enrollment option.
- Enrollment at the elementary schools, especially Dickinson, is only going to continue to grow. Don't forget about enhanced & expanded playground equipment to accommodate a diverse array of students and abilities. This is not an amenity, but an essential component of an elementary school.
- I don't want my taxes to go up. They are already to high.
- High School is definitely in more of a need than the other schools as it relates to the building itself and the ability to offer appropriate courses for successful students.
- My personal belief is that schools are for education and if we are requiring children to attend school and educators to work at the physical buildings, those buildings need to be safe and secure. The schools need to be a priority whether people choose to believe that or not.
- Security would be my chosen priority, but all of the needs appear appropriate
- I would, however I am unsure that I would have a vote on that since we live out of district and do open enrollment to your school.


- Highly dependent on priority plan for needs.

- We would hope that there have been budget provisions set aside for long range building projects. Upkeep and maintenance is an important process for certain. Hopefully, the district has been and continues to be fiscally responsible in planning over the past several years.
- Please see my prior comment. As long as De Pere employs two school districts and wastes this type of money with two full time administrations, it is hard to argue that there should be more money given. Every other city in the nation has figured this out but one.
- Since our children have graduated from the De Pere High School, it's difficult to evaluate some questions and provide feedback.




